MILL CITY TO PURCHASE ROAD MAKING OUTFIT

Mill City, Or., Jan. 23.—The delegation which went to Albany, Wednesday, on road matters, secured the permission of the county court to purchase a roadmaking outfit, providing the taxpayers interested are agreeable and for this purpose a meeting of the taxpayers will be held in the school house Saturday evening. The outfit will consist of a tractor, scarifier and digger and will cost approximately \$1700. The Mill City district will have control of the machinery at all times, but when not in use can rent it to immediate adjoining districts, which would help pay for it. It will also be one of the first district-owned outfits in Linn county, a step forward in the matter of good roads.

Jack Haek, bridge and building foreman for the Southern Pacific company, together with his gang and outfit cars, left for Detroit, Wednesday, where they will be working on the new few darts located on company bridges and other repair work.

The Hammond Lumber company has a gang of men busy repairing their electric light lines about the city, which have been damaged considerably during the winter by high winds, quite a few of the poles being about ready to topple over.

The basketball teams of the Mill City high school will clash with the Turner high school teams here Friday night. Mill City went to Turner several weeks ago and defeated both teams, and Turner will no doubt make a desperate effort to get revenge, assuring a good fast game.

The annual basketball games between the Mill City fire department and the Whitney Lumber company of Garibaldi have been arranged again this year. Mill City going to Garibaldi on January 31 and they coming here on February 14. Harry Morgan, manager of the Whitney Lumber company, was formerly superintendent of the mill here and was very active with the teams here. Since his departure the annual games with his newly organized team at Garibaldi have been the most exciting of the season. Mill City has always got the worst of the argument until last year, when they took both games, causing much rejoicing among the fans. Garibaldi will no doubt try to get revenge this year, and the games will be eagerly looked forward to by the fans. Next Saturday night the Hanes Bros. team of the commercial league at Salem play the Mill City team here.

GARDEAU MEETS DAWSON TONIGHT

The principals are all ready for the exciting going at the arena tonight in the fourth program to be given by Matchmaker Harry Plant. The card ought to be the best yet presented by Plant as he has secured two good scrappers in Billy Gardeau of Portland and Charles Dawson of Eugene, who will fight the ten-round main event.

Harry Plant has also arranged a fast six-round go between Spike Crookan and M. Hummings of Portland for the semi-windup.

Perry and O'Leary, both of Portland will meet in a 4 round bout. The Fox twins will also be matched.

GYMNASIUM AND PLAY ROOM FOR JEFFERSON

The Jefferson schools have installed a new gymnasium and play room for school children at an expense of \$2000 with one of the finest floors she has ever seen. The apparatus has been carefully selected, she states, and plans are being made for exercises in the near future to dedicate the new structure. T. O. Davis is principal of the school.

At Woodburn, Mrs. Fulkerson states, she found the finest organized curriculum and work plan, which she declares she is willing to put up against any school in the state. E. E. Fagan is superintendent there. She says that he has the work of every student at his finger tips and has installed a system by which he has knowledge of the hourly progress of every student in the woodburn high school. During the week, she says, the school had some problem of thrift in connection with every subject considered in all classes.

Rural School Supervisor Fox has just completed visits to Evergreen, Centerville, Willard, Silver Falls, Union Hill and Riverview, and today is visiting North Santiam, Crawford and West Stayton. At Silver Falls, he states, the attendance record is exceedingly high, regardless of the fact that the nearest pupil lives one half a mile from the school and the average distance to travel for pupils is from two to two and one-half miles.

PRISON TERMS GIVEN TO POLK COUNTY YOUTHS

Dallas, Or., Jan. 23.—Earry McKee of Independence, found guilty Tuesday night by a jury on a charge of statutory rape, was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary by Circuit Judge Ramsey today. The law fixes the penalty from 3 to 20 years.

Tom Garland, defense attorney, asked for 30 days to file a bill of exceptions and 60 days to provide a transcript of evidence if an appeal was taken. This was granted and bail was fixed at \$1000 which McKee posted.

Marvin Calkins, the third youth to face a statutory rape charge, was convicted, the jury deliberating for about an hour and a half. Testimony developed that Calkins had married a Sheridan girl in Independence, took her to her home and returned to his home near Airle the night before the date in which he was charged with the crime against a 14-year-old Airle girl. Calkins will appear for sentence Saturday. Frank Cooper, convicted of the same charge Monday, will be sentenced today. The date of sentence was postponed from Thursday.

The indictment against Dale Serafford, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, was found to be defective and the case was dismissed without trial. It was announced that it would be placed before the grand jury in April.

Robert Sutphin of Ballston goes on trial this morning on the same charge in which the three other young men have been convicted.

SAM H. TETHEROW POLK COUNTY PIONEER DEAD

Dallas, Or., Jan. 23.—Samuel H. Tetherow, aged 82 years, died Wednesday at his home in Dallas following an illness of several months brought on by a fall.

Mr. Tetherow was one of Polk county's earliest pioneers. He crossed the plains with his parents in 1845, as a boy of nine years. The family spent the first winter on the present townsite of Dallas, where there was just one log cabin and in the spring took up a donation land claim on the Luckiamute near the junction of the big and little Luckiamute rivers.

When the Indian troubles came on in the 50's, Mr. Tetherow enlisted and served under Captain Hayden during 1855-6, in what is now the state of Washington. Only one member of the old company, Dave Hedge of Independence, survives.

Mr. Tetherow was born in Polk county, Missouri, March 6, 1836. He is the last of a family of seven to pass on. During his entire active lifetime he was a farmer in the Luckiamute country. He served one term as mayor of Falls City, for the past six years he has resided in Dallas.

Mr. Tetherow is survived by his widow and four sons, Columbus
