

GRAND OPERA SEASON TO OPEN NEXT THURSDAY

The Trans-continental tour of the San Carlo Grand Opera company, which is scheduled to appear at the Portland auditorium in regularity under Kirsya concert bureau direction on January 29, 30 and 31, is one succession of triumphal successes. In every city in which they play capacity houses are attracted, the excellence of the artist singers, and the artistry of the productions appealing to the genuine opera-lover the country over. At their recent engagement in Detroit, Michigan, they were especially praised. Charlotte M.
