

CHILD HEALTH WORKERS HOUSED IN HI SCHOOL

A new instructor will be added to the teaching staff of the Salem public schools as a result of action taken by the school board last night. The teacher secured is Miss Gladys Tipton, graduate of New Mexico normal school and a grade school teacher of three years' experience.

The resignation of Miss Teresa Fowle was accepted at last night's meeting, and Miss Clara Thompson selected to take her place.

Criticism of the condition of the high school building resulted in the board taking definite action to notify Superintendent Hugg to instruct J. C. Neeson, high school principal, to keep the building clear of marks and other defacements.

Upon report of a committee instructed to secure rooms for the staff connected with the Harkness health demonstration program, it was decided to give them rooms in the southeast corner of the high school building, on the first floor. Indications are that the corps of nurses will take possession as soon as they arrive, which will not be for several weeks.

Two hundred fifty dollars was appropriated to buy material for an addition to be added to the J. L. Parrish junior high school building. The work of building the addition will be done by the manual training department of the school and will be begun at once. The extra space provided will be used by the manual training department.

A total of \$1362.50 saved under the budget estimate from the expenses of three of the public schools was reported by the superintendent.
