NEW CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCH OPENS SUNDAY

The new Christian Science church which will be formally opened on the first time tomorrow morning, has incorporated into it the old building, which was the first Christian Science church in Oregon to be dedicated. It became known today. The old church building, which stood almost directly across Clametek street from the site of the new building, was dedicated Sunday, April 13, 1903.

While being built into the new structure the old church has been remodeled and generally improved. It will be used for the Sunday school, and as a room for business meetings. It has been in actual use as a church room since July 15, 1924 in its present location. The most modern and up to date equipment has been installed throughout the building.

Excavation of the New Salem Y.M.C.A. building will start next Monday. It was announced by Y.M.C.A. authorities this morning. The contract has been let to the Oregon Transfer company of Salem. The excavation will measure 26 by 129 feet.
