Silverton, Or., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—At a special meeting of the stockholders of the Silverton Food Products company the question of joining the canners association which is being formed for the purpose of establishing a central sales agency, was discussed. No opposition was shown among the stockholders of the Silverton canner company and the board of directors was asked to sign up.

A meeting of the board of directors was also held at which time the same officers were elected as served last year. M. Stouriste was added to the officers by being elected assistant secretary and finance officer. The officers re-elected were John Goplerud, president; H. Gerrin, vice-president, and Norris Ames, secretary-treasurer.

MYERS CASE TO BE REARGUED

Washington, Feb. 3.—The power of the president to remove post masters without obtaining the approval of the senate, involved in a case brought from Portland, Ore., by Frank S. Myers, will be re-argued in the supreme court.

The case was reopened today. Chief Justice Taft directing attention to the failure of the post-office department to appear in the argument, and announcing that Senator Pepper of Pennsylvania would make an argument as "a friend of the court."

The reargument will take place either on March 16 or April 13.

A state law requiring a license for the sale of intoxicating liquor is valid and can be enforced notwithstanding the federal prohibition amendment, the supreme court held today in a case from New Jersey.

The conviction in the lower courts of Anthony Colara charged with selling intoxicating liquor without a state license, was affirmed.

COUNCIL VOTES TRAFFIC RULES PARRISH SCHOOL

A traffic ordinance forbidding parking on North Capitol street between Lambersen and D streets, that portion on which the Parrish school fronts, was passed in a rush by the city council last night, in view of an emergency pointed out by Alderman S. E. Purvine.

The ordinance further prohibits autos or other vehicles from discharging or taking on passengers on this area.

Pedestrians are also to be subject to traffic rules on this section of street, provides the ordinance, naming lanes to be marked on the pavement across which pedestrians must go if they wish to cross at this point.

In order to keep the motoring public trained in observing this ordinance, Alderman W. W. Rosbraugh explained that the committee which drew up the ordinance decided to leave the restriction in force the year round, although it is manifestly only a safety provision for school children.

Stops will not be necessary at the white line to be painted. Fine or imprisonment may be imposed for failure to abide by the provisions of this ordinance.

SALEM TO PLAY M'MINNVILLE

The Salem high school basketball team will go to McMinnville tonight to meet the high school five. Salem won by a score of 25 to 8 here, but McMinnville has improved and a close game is expected.

Ashland won over the locals after a hard fought game on the local floor by a score of 30 to 25.

PUBLIC HEARING ON BANKING CODE TO BE THURSDAY

The joint committee on banking will conduct a public hearing Thursday evening of this week on the revision of the state banking code, according to announcement yesterday by Senator Butler, chairman of the senate committee.

Senator Clark yesterday introduced a joint resolution providing for a constitutional amendment giving cities and incorporated towns the right of excess condemnation. This it is explained, would give the right, in case part of a lot is needed, to take the whole by paying the owner for it according to appraised value under the condemnation act. The measure has application to the proposed widening of Broadway and Burnside streets in Portland.

HERRIOT SUSTAINED AGAINST VATICAN ENVOYS

Paris, Feb. 3.—(By Associated Press)—The chamber of deputies last evening voted for the suppression of the French embassy to the vatican by 314 against 250.

Premier Herriot had previously announced he would stake the question of confidence on this proposition and the chamber gave him the necessary vote.

HARGROVE TO REMAIN PARK SUPERINTENDENT

An amicable understanding was reached between the city council and the Salem park board last night when L. P. Aldrich, Homer Smith and Miss Edith Massard appeared by request of the council to explain action taken in the reduction of the pay of T. L. Hargrove, park superintendent. The members of the park board were summoned as a result of a letter written by Mr. Hargrove to the council in which he alleged unfairness in the determining of his salary. Before the hearing of the other side of the story last night, another letter was read from Mr. Hargrove, asserting that he wished to withdraw the letter of complaint and averring that all differences had been ironed out.

A few questions were asked by some members of the council, not relating to the Hargrove affair, after Mr. Aldrich had said that there never was any disposition to dispose of the services of Mr. Hargrove, and that he was satisfied with present arrangements. Different members of the council assured the park board that there was no disposition on the part of the council to interfere with park administration.

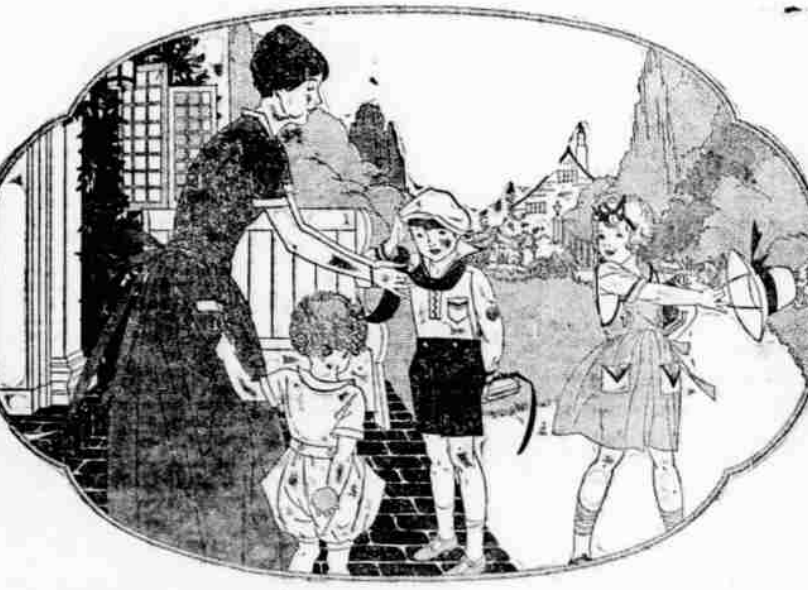
