## NO CASE AGAINST COZY DOLAN

New York, Feb. 4.—Jimmy O'Connell, blacklisted outfielder of the New York Giants, may be guilty by his confession of violating the New York state laws covering baseball bribery, but there is no case against Cozy Dolan, former coach, also banished from the game, according to the report of the district attorney's investigation into scandal made public today.

The report disclosing that no new evidence has been unearthed to alter the case as it stood last fall following the expulsion of O'Connell and Dolan by Commissioner Landis also reiterates that there is no ground for implicating Ross Young, George Kelly and Frank Frisch, Giant stars named by O'Connell as having knowledge of the deal, but exonerated by Landis.

## SALEM DEFEATS McMINNVILLE

Another victory was marked to the credit of the Salem high school basketball team last night when they took a decision over the McMinnville high five on the latter's floor by a score of 21 to 19. The game was hard fought, with Salem in the lead during most of the game. In the last few minutes McMinnville tied the score at 19 all.

Salem took the lead and were leading at the end of the first half by a score of 12 to 7. At the end of the third quarter the score stood 17 to 9 in favor of the red and black. In the last quarter McMinnville threw four baskets in quick succession. Ashby for the locals was high point man with 3 markers to his credit.

Tomorrow night the locals will leave for Ashland where they are to play a two game series with the southern Oregon team. A former meeting at Salem ended 23 to 39 in favor of Ashland after one of the fastest games seen on the local floor. The locals are hoped to break even.

## FALL CITY LUMBER MILL SOLD TO COTTAGE GROVE

Falls City, Or., Feb. 4.—W. T. Brown and Colonel Matthews sold their lumber mill here to W. S. Daugherty of Cottage Grove, Saturday, and the new owner has taken possession. The mill is located at the mouth of Dutch creek, one-half mile west of Falls City, and has been operated by Messrs. Brown and Matthews for about 2 1/2 years. The sale included the mill docks, logging engines equipment and some timber.

## Missing Link Skull Found in South Africa 50 Feet in Limestone

London, Feb. 4.—"Anatropithecus africanus," as Professor Raymond Dart has named the original owner of the skull which he discovered at Taung, Bechuanaland, has stirred interest among anthropologists and anatomists here. Their attention is all the more closely engaged because of Professor Dart's well established reputation.

"If Professor Dart makes claim to a certain discovery I am prepared to regard it as reliable," says Sir Arthur Keith, noted anthropologist, when shown Cape Town dispatches, in which Professor Dart ascribed the greatest importance to his find. Sir Arthur, however, added that it would probably be more correct to regard the skull as one hundred of "missing links" rather than the "missing link," as an additional piece of evidence in the theory of man's evolution.

Grafton Elliot Smith, professor of anatomy at the University of London and an authority on evolution, also paid tribute to the trustworthiness of the discoverer. He recalled that Professor Dart was with him when the famous Rhodesian skull was found and anatomical research. Professor Smith expressed belief that the skull belongs to "a period twice as long before the Pithecanthropus and Java skulls as the latter were before ourselves."

The dispatches describing the discovery said the skull was buried in limestone at a depth of 50 feet, represented something midway between man and the great apes, and was much finer than previously discovered prehistoric skulls. Its owner, Professor Dart said, while not human, was yet more intelligent than the gorilla or chimpanzee and must be regarded rather as a man-like ape than as an ape-like man.
