Exhibit of Mr. Euwer's Work Opens

It isn't every day that one can see a poet and an artist minus coat with shirt sleeves rolled up, wielding a hammer, and discussing with him the possible safety of a tall ladder leaning precariously against a plate glass window frame. That privilege was accorded a few speculative souls who yesterday wandered into the large room in the Marion hotel building where Anthony Euwer's exhibit of pastels, oils and water colors, book plates and posters will be formally opened tonight under the sponsorship of the Salem Arts League.

Anthony Euwer, the man, and Anthony Euwer, the poet, are well known to Salem folk. His poems of the northwest have always been favorites not only in literary circles but also with just "plain folks" who understand the language he speaks.

Last year he appeared personally in a program at Waller hall. During the next four days Salem will also have the privilege of knowing Anthony Euwer, the artist.

"I have always dabbled in colors as well as in words," said Mr. Euwer yesterday while he was busily arranging some of those gorgeous forest fire pastels which have already made him famous. "But I never felt the color urge so strongly until I came to the northwest about ten years ago. Before then I used black and white mostly."

Practically all of his books from the "Cat Book," or as it is formally called "Christopher Crick on Cats," which first appeared in 1909 to "By Scarlet Torch and Blade," one of his latest, are greatly enhanced by the illustrations which Mr. Euwer has given them. A number of his book plates which he has used in his own editions and which have been used by other writers are included in the collection which he is showing. Posters which have been used in the magazine sections of large dairies will also be shown.

Mr. Euwer is rightfully called the "painter of the Oregon country," for the majority of his scenes are familiar subjects to Oregonians. He does successfully what has been so seldom accomplished—the delineation of the majestic beauty of the forest fire retaining meanwhile the horror of the waste and devastation that is left in its wake.

The fire scenes form only a small group of the scenes which Mr. Euwer has chosen for showing here. "If we must classify," said the artist, quizzically, "we might divide them into three groups—the fire scenes, the winter scenes and the nocturnal scenes."

Mrs. J. M. Clifford, prominent member of the league, has been attending to the arrangements for the exhibit. Mr. Euwer will make a short talk to the Arts League members and their guests at the formal opening tonight.

A. A. U. W. Joins 'Movie' League

Realizing the great importance of the motion picture in the educational process, the Salem branch of the American Association of University Women has joined the national moving picture league in order to have a constructive and definite outline in promoting better films.

The national motion picture league had its origin at Columbia university more than nine years ago. It is composed of educators, psychologists, social workers and clergymen having no connection with any phase of the motion picture industry. It is a non-commercial, non-political and cooperative organization, having as its aim the promotion and patronage of better motion pictures. The league judges pictures principally from a moral standpoint. Their review board in New York city select from all pictures produced for national distribution, those pictures suitable for adult, young people and children. These pictures they list in weekly bulletins before the pictures are released to any theater, not after. These weekly bulletins assist schools, churches, clubs and exhibitors in choosing pictures for their communities that are clean and wholesome.

By means of an educational campaign, thru publicity in newspapers, by addressing public gatherings and the radio, the national moving picture league now reaches fifteen million people. The league believes that if the public is given an opportunity to know what is good, the public will always choose the best. If good pictures can be made to pay at the box office, producers will be encouraged to make more of them. A list of pictures recently endorsed by the league follows:

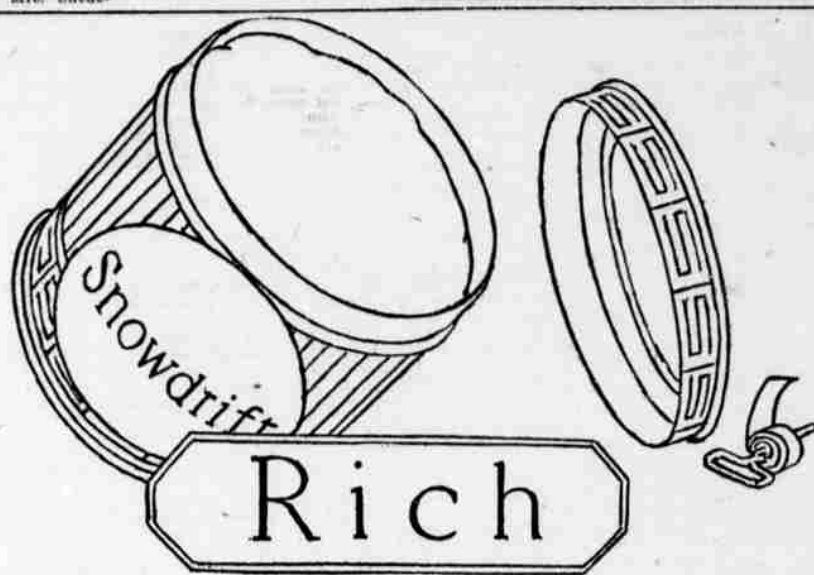
