NAVAL OFFICERS FEAR TO TELL OF AIRCRAFT TRUTHS

Washington, Feb. 4.—The controversy among army and navy officers over the value of aircraft took on new ramifications today when Representative Perkins, republican, New Jersey, announced that three navy officers had requested the house aircraft committee not to summon them because they could not give their honest views for fear of being disciplined.

On the army side, the row already has resulted in a request from Secretary Weeks that Brigadier General Mitchell, assistant chief of the air service, explain certain statements he made to congress in support of increased aviation facilities.

General Mitchell declared that certain officers were afraid to "tell the truth about aircraft" through a fear of being disciplined "indirectly" through transfer to less favorable posts.

Representative Perkins would not reveal the names of the navy officers who asked not to be summoned, but he said that one of them had declared if he testified what he believed—"well, Guam is a long distance away."

He said the request had come to him as chief examiner of the aircraft committee. He also declared it would be an "outrage" should General Mitchell fail to reappointment as assistant chief of the air service and thus automatically be subject to the rank of colonel.

Perkins' request for information about his testimony, a decision of the general's reappointment is held in abeyance.

"I propose if possible," Mr. Perkins added, "to determine to what extent terrorization prevents officers from telling the truth to congress."

HEAVY PENALTY FOR DRUNKEN AUTO DRIVERS

Operators of motor vehicles by intoxicated persons is made a misdemeanor subject to fine of from \$100 to \$500 and imprisonment from 60 days to six months by a senate bill passed today. It was introduced at the request of officials of the state motor association.

If a death is caused by an intoxicated driver he is liable to conviction on manslaughter.

Senator Klepper fought the bill as being too drastic for enforcement and cited the opinion of eastern judges who have expressed themselves on the bill.

Senator Toose and Senator Butler argued for the bill, Butler declaring that no man has a right to operate as dangerous a machine as an automobile on the crowded highways. Senator Johnson supporting the bill, declared a drunken automobile driver more of a menace than would be a man turned loose upon the highway with a revolver in each hand shooting promiscuously.

Carlson branded as the arch criminal in the state "the drunk and sounder around with an automobile."

Sensor Klepper informed the senate that all the drunken drivers are not of the male sex, particularly in Portland. He favored the bill. Klepper had read a letter from a circuit judge who seemed to oppose the bill. This caused Eddy in his closing arguments to flay the judge, declaring that if that were the attitude of the judges of the state he would be in favor of restricting the power of judges still more than done by the bill.

"If for one," said Eddy, "resent the frivolous, superficial, capricious and contemptuous manner in which the judge caste reflections on this senate."

Klepper, though he had fought the bill, voted for it. Only Upton voted against it.

OPEN HEARING ON TEXT BOOKS

An open hearing on the kindergarten and free text book bills, introduced in the house, has been scheduled for 7:30 p. m. tomorrow by the joint educational committee. A considerable number of Portlanders are expected to be on hand for the session.

The educational committee of the house laid house bill 394 providing for Americanization work in the state on the table yesterday for further discussion. Catherine Bradshaw, of the Americanization council at Portland appeared before the committee yesterday to explain the aims of the bill's backers.

Representative King, of the educational committee, expressed the opinion that a law as proposed by the Americanization measure would be of great value to those parts of the state having a large percentage in foreign element and no means for providing training on lines leading to good citizenship.

BE CAREFUL ACCIDENTS IN SALEM THIS YEAR THIS WEEK

George H. Burnett, 355 N. High street, and L. K. Slegmund of Salem, bumped their cars together this morning. L. J. Karst bumped the fender of another car near the police station this morning.

Unexpected difficulty in striking water has been met by J. L. Barry, foreman of the new Klett building on Ferry street, and by H. E. Evans, well driller, in providing the flow of water for the swimming pool on the first floor of the building.

At 305 feet they struck quick sands and are now held up by a large rock, on which several charges of dynamite have had no effect. The casing was ruined for several lengths in the attempt to blast this rock, and steel was left in the path of the drill, necessitating a new hole. A well 43 feet deep was dug, six feet in diameter, until a stratum of "nigger heads," boulders the size of a waste basket, rounded and smooth as glass, was struck, revealing the former course of a river, according to Barry.

Mr. Barry and Mr. Evans plan to drill the new hole 30 feet down in eight inch diameter, then a six inch hole till they strike water. If they have to get it from the China sea.

A wall of rock lies between the Klett building and the river, believe the drillers, making it necessary to drill to at least 450 feet before any hope for water can be fulfilled. Eighty feet down they struck blue soapstone, through which the drill sunk for 212 feet.

A large flow of water will be necessary for the swimming pool, for a complete refilling every 12 hours is planned by a constant circulating system of filtration. The pool is 28 feet by 74 feet, and is 8 1/2 feet deep at the end to be used for diving. Opening of the pool for public use will take place in 60 or 90 days says Mr. Barry. Men's locker rooms and women's locker rooms are built ready for use.

A slop-over trough extends around the tank, which will mark the surface level of the water, and the bank ledge slopes away from the edge of the tank, in order that no water may drain back into the pool.

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STATE TIMBER HOLDINGS ARE CENTRALIZED

The state land board has approved the exchange of isolated tracts of timberland belonging to the state, for a tract of equal acreage owned by the federal government. Authorization was granted the state forester to make formal application for the lands, and this action was taken upon notification of the approval of the exchange.

The tract of land involved in the exchange lies in Coos and Douglas counties just south of the Umpqua River and comprises about 70,000 acres. While the stand of merchantable timber on the tract is somewhat less than that on the school lands, nevertheless there is an excellent growth of young trees that will reach a merchantable size in a few years. The timber growing possibilities of the tract are excellent as it is located in one of the most favorable sections of the state, and the fire risk is low. Also it is only a short distance from transportation. On the other hand much of the state lands produce only small amounts of timber. Transportation problems are difficult and the fire risk is high. The Millicoma tract, as the new state forest will probably be designated, will also offer an excellent opportunity for the students of the forestry department of the Oregon Agricultural College to carry on experiments and gain practical experience in field work.

There are about 2,000 acres less in the federal tract of land than in the state lands offered for exchange and the difference will be made up through the state acquiring title to public and O. and C. lands lying in and adjacent to the Millicoma tract.

Preliminary steps for the exchange were taken in 1919 when Governor West and State Forester F. A. Elliott had bills introduced in the legislature authorizing the exchange. These bills passed and in August of the following year a memorandum of agreement was drawn up and signed by Governor Olcott and the secretary of agriculture. Steps were immediately taken to cruise the state lands and while this work was being carried on efforts were made to locate a tract of land suitable for the exchange. Upon the selection of the Millicoma tract, and extensive reconnaissance was made by state and government officials. This tract was finally settled upon by both parties as a basis for the exchange.

The action of the state land board is assurance that the exchange will be consummated and the final steps will be the exchange of titles to the lands involved.

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
