

WHAT IS DOING IN LEGISLATIVE SESSION

BANKS LICENSE

BILL DEBATED FOR TWO HOURS

In a debate of more than two hours in the hall of representatives last night arguments for and against the Banks license bill were presented, each side being given an hour and then Senator Banks being allowed 15 minutes for rebuttal. The bill proposes to grant the right of appeal to the circuit court from orders of municipal officials revoking the licenses of hotels, pool rooms, soft drink establishments and similar places.

Banks, in opening the argument for his bill, referred to the political power wielded through the license revoking authority by the Portland city council, and applying his favorite term of "czars" to the Portland councilmen, declaring that they do not want this power taken away from them. "The curse of political power," he said, "is one of the greatest curses in this country today."

John F. Logan, Portland attorney, presented an eloquent argument for the bill. Robert McGuire asserted that no body of men should constitute themselves judge, jury and prosecutor in one. He referred to raids which he charged are staged just before election for political effect, but on persons who have no votes. Before a body that exercises both executive and judicial power he declared there is not the chance for fair play that is afforded by the courts. He accused the Portland commissioners of revoking the license of one club, against which no evidence was obtained, and solely on the ground that the club did not have enough members.

Callie Bigelow Pharisee, John Kaste, another Portland lawyer, called the city council prosecutor, judge, jury, turnkey and jailer.

"Whenever I see Commissioner Bigelow," said Kaste, "I think what a pity it is that he did not live in the days of our Saviors, for he would have been a most excellent Pharisee. There is nothing fair about Bigelow."

Frank S. Grant, Portland city attorney, answering the arguments of the proponents of the bill, declared that the measure would transfer all license revocation cases to the circuit court, that no defense would be attempted before the council and that the circuit court would become administrator of the license laws of the city.

"The type of places that the present method aims to reach," said Grant, "is the successor to the old saloon, with the bar, the card tables and other equipment that the saloon once had, also houses that attempt to operate as houses of prostitution, and grocery stores that are only grocery stores in name; but real places of law violation. Appeal to the circuit court under this bill would make a farce of law enforcement."

Grant declared that if property owners would "look for legitimate tenants and not for the almighty dollar all the time moral conditions in this state would be a whole lot better."

Bans the Clubs.
He rapped sharply the gambling clubs that have been organized under the laws of Oregon. Over 100 appeals to the circuit court, he said, would have been taken last year under the Banks bill. The majority of cases before the city council, declared Grant, are those of people who have no sympathy with the prohibition law or for moral conditions.

Robert Inlay, assistant city attorney of Portland, asserted that the taking away of a license to do business was not taking away a fundamental right.

Chris Schuebel, city attorney of Oregon City, said the bill would affect every city in the state and would congest the circuit and supreme courts.

"In my opinion," said Schuebel, "this bill was drawn solely in the interests of the man who wants to violate the laws, not the man who wants to obey it. We are interested in Oregon City."

W. P. Newell, representing the law enforcement committee of the city of Portland, submitted a statement in writing. This statement asserted that the bill provides for a trial in the circuit court rather than an appeal. At every trial of a dive keeper or a bootlegger, it asserted, other dive keepers and bootleggers occupy the front seats so they may become acquainted with the state's wit-

MUTUAL SAVINGS BANK PROPOSAL GIVEN APPROVAL

The house committee on banking has reported favorably on Representative Gordon's bill authorizing the incorporation of mutual savings banks. Many changes have been made in the bill, the most important being elimination of a provision for establishing branch institutions.

Under the bill a mutual savings bank could be established in the state without capital. Its directors would have to post \$5000 as a guaranty fund, and the directors themselves would have to be satisfactory to the state superintendent of banks. They would also have to pay all operating expenses of the institution until it was on a paying basis.

"The \$5000 guaranty fund would have to be built up to a point of 10 per cent of total deposits. After this point was reached, the directors would be authorized to reimburse themselves for the \$5000 advanced."

The measure would require that 70 per cent of funds on deposit could be loaned on first mortgages on real estate at an appraised value of 75 per cent. The 30 per cent balance would have to be kept in first class securities.

Representative Gordon points out that all savings banks of New York are mutuals. Many other states have them, he informed the committee.

"The primary advantage is that they insure the depositor on his money," explained Gordon.

A. A. Hale spoke in behalf of the bill. Banks, closing his argument, intimated that the city council yields to the influence of big business and discriminated against the small business man. He contrasted the statement of Schuebel about appeals to the circuit court, declaring that the bill did not provide for appeals to the supreme court. He asserted that the measure was in the interest of law enforcement.

BILL PROVIDES FOR TRANSFER PROSECUTORS

District attorneys disqualified for one reason or another to handle a case in their own county could be substituted for by the same officer of another county under provisions of house bill 133 passed by the house yesterday afternoon. Peirce, of Coos and Curry counties, introduced the measure.

The meat and herd inspector in Yamhill county would have his pay raised from \$8 to \$10 a day under house bill 68 passed.

Salary of the county judge of Curry county would be raised from \$1,000 a year to \$1,500 a year by house bill 134 passed.

House bill 169, providing that the supreme court of Oregon be authorized to lay down a set of rules for court procedure in the state, passed. Garkins, of Jackson county, explained that such a measure would permit of devising improvements to speed up court action.

House bill 243 providing for procedure in vacating platted acreage for roads and other purposes passed.

The county court would be authorized to levy up to ten mills rather than only five mills against school districts failing to levy that sum sufficient to bring its total up to \$620 under house bill 260, passed.

TWO RESOLUTIONS PASSED

The senate passed a concurrent resolution introduced by Eddy providing for a committee to investigate the feasibility of a teachers' retirement fund. It also adopted a joint resolution introduced by Pisk expressing appreciation to Mrs. Edwin W. Morse and Edward Dornbecher for a gift of \$200,000 to the University of Oregon medical school.

MORTGAGES ON BONUS LAND NOT TRANSFERABLE

A house bill introduced by Bailey, providing that beneficiaries under the state bonus and loan act may transfer their mortgages by which a loan from the state is secured in event they dispose of the property mortgaged to the state and acquire other property, passed the senate yesterday.

Senator Strayer's bill providing for the sale at public auction of abandoned and starving horses was passed by the senate.

The Multnomah delegation of the senate is wrestling with the bill introduced by Staples to abolish the office of constable in Multnomah county and transfer the duties of the office to the sheriff. A substitute bill will probably be prepared. Staples objects to the large number of salaried deputies employed by the constable. Senator Klepper contends, and says he has the word of the sheriff in Multnomah county for it, that just as many deputies would have to be used by the sheriff and that they would receive higher salaries. Klepper also called attention to the fact that the deputy constables serve summons for the court of domestic relations without charge, and that the same provision would have to be made in the Staples bill regarding deputy sheriffs.

WARY CONSULTS WITH THE PRESIDENT

Washington, Feb. 5.—President Coolidge's disposition to place responsibility for enactment of agricultural legislation on congress brought assurances from republican senate leaders today that an earnest effort would be made to press farm measures based on the report of the agricultural commission.

Senators Watson of Indiana, assistant republican leader, and McNary, Oregon, ranking republican member of the agricultural committee, discussed the situation today with the president.

SALARY RAISES CAUSE PROTEST

The Multnomah delegation of the senate will introduce a bill providing for an increase in the salary of Martin Pratt, chief deputy sheriff of Multnomah county from \$250 to \$275 a month. It will authorize the sheriff to make the increase. Mr. Pratt is seeking an increase to \$300 a month and the draft of a bill to that effect was handed the delegation, but because of the protest that goes up over the state over all salary increase measures the delegation would not go that strong.

Senator Staples introduced a bill to increase the salaries of the supreme court judges from \$5200 to \$7500 a year, and says he is being swamped with condemnatory letters as a result.
