CITY DIVIDED INTO 100 DISTRICTS FOR RED CROSS

For the annual Red Cross membership roll call, the city of Salem for the week beginning Monday, Feb. 9, the city has been divided into 100 districts, according to T. M. Hicks, chairman of the Red Cross roll call for Salem.

All service clubs of the city, as well as many other organizations interested in the work of the American Red Cross, are arranging to send workers out next Monday morning.

All these workers have been requested to meet at the chamber of commerce at 9 o'clock next Monday morning. In order that there will be no duplication in working, certain territory will be assigned, Mr. Hicks said.

"Although funds for Willamette chapter, which includes Marion and Polk counties, were exhausted last August, yet the Red Cross has managed to handle from 125 to 150 papers a month for ex-service men, their families or their dependents," declared Mr. Hicks. "But we have now reached the place where the Red Cross work of the two counties must be given support and for this reason all the active organizations in both counties interested in community welfare have been asked to take part in the roll call next week."

Tom Kay, president of the Rotary club of Salem has issued a call to every Rotarian urging them to take part in the work next week and to meet with other workers next Monday morning at 9 o'clock at the chamber of commerce for instructions and assignments.

SALEM DEBATES WITH FRANKLIN

Salem high school will meet Franklin high of Portland tomorrow night in a dual debate in the second contest of the season. The debate will be a dual affair, negative teams traveling. Avery Thompson and Margaret Provo uphold the negative for Salem, and will make the trip to Portland. Homer Richards and Thomas Childs, the affirmative team, will speak at Salem. The debate will be held in the high school auditorium and is slated to begin at 7:30.

Two weeks ago Silverton lost to Franklin in a dual debate by a two to one decision at both ends. Last week Salem defeated Silverton by unanimous scores, indicating that Salem should have a slight edge on the Portlanders.

Tomorrow night's debate has no bearing on district standings in the state league. The question to be used is "Resolved, That a strong third party would promote the interest of good government in the United States." The same question was used in the Salem-Silverton and the Franklin-Silverton contests.

SALEMITE LONGS FOR WIFE IN FAR DISTANT MANILA

Some men may wish that their wives could not speak English; some may wish that the ocean separated them from their wives. But yesterday the story came to light of a former member of the United States marine corps—his name is withheld—who is now living in Salem, while his wife, a well educated Russian girl whom he married in Vladivostok, is forced to remain in Manila, Philippine Islands, unable to join her husband in Oregon. The file of letters at the Salem Red Cross office contains a large assortment of letters dealing with the case, some dating as far back as 1922. Red Cross office at Salem, San Francisco, Manila and Vladivostok have been busy on the case for years.

It was on August 15, 1922, that this unnamed marine, whose home is in Salem, married the girl at Vladivostok, having known her for a month. She could read and write Russian very well; he could do the same with English, but neither could read or write the other's language.

Since marriage neither has had a chance to learn the other's language, for immediately after the ceremony his ship left for Manila. Over a year later she followed him there, but soon after her arrival he was sent home in a transport. She has been there ever since. The Red Cross authorities have not worked for her, but no husband. He remains in Salem, not having the cash to bring her here or to go to Manila himself.

At the office of the Salem Red Cross it was stated yesterday that efforts are still being made to bring the two together in some way, in the hope that eventually she may learn to speak English, or he Russian, or both.

ALLOWS \$100,000 TO COMMISSION

The ways and means committee last night voted to appropriate \$100,000 for the public service commission, instead of the \$140,000 requested by the commission. The budget commission, by vote of Governor Pierce and Jefferson Myers, majority members of the commission, refused to recommend anything for the department.

The ways and means committee members engaged in a spirited argument over what should be done about the commission's appropriation.

The state board of health, the state livestock sanitary board, the state board of horticulture, the adjutant general's department and the state fair board placed their claims before the committee last night.

LITTLE HOPE OF RESCUING CAVE VICTIM

plunged by one foot, for one week.

The general belief was that he has succumbed; by being crushed to death or by suffocation or by pneumonia, any of which would end his long fight to live.

Early today however, radio was resorted to in hope the cave would give up its secret. A two stage audio frequency amplifier was connected in the lighting circuit leading into the cave, and known to be intact. The lights were turned off, and with head sets clamped to their ears, the experimenters listened for any sound that might be interpreted as coming from Collins. After the test, the men said that they had heard distinct sounds, believed by them to have been caused by the jarring of the carbon filament in the electric light bulb fastened about Collins' neck. It was commented that, if alive, Collins had probably moved when the light went out, thus shaking the filament. On the other hand, it was pointed out that other noises might have caused the sounds heard in the head sets. Thus, nothing definite was determined.

The work on the new shaft was begun yesterday and early today a hole ten feet deep had been made. The work was slowed up by the necessity of timbering the shaft as it is deepened. It has been estimated that Collins is lying 55 feet below the surface. Estimates as to the time it will take to sink the shaft vary from 24 to 72 hours. Modern apparatus is replacing the primitive means previously used.

NOMINATION OF STONE CONFIRMED

Washington, Feb. 6.—Although the nomination of Attorney General Stone to be a supreme court justice was confirmed last night by the senate, Mr. Stone will be unable to take his place on the bench until March 2, when the court convenes after its present recess.

Mr. Stone can qualify immediately, however, by taking a first oath of office. Should he pursue that course, Assistant Attorney General Donovan would become acting head of the department of justice until the senate acts on

the appointment of Charles D. Warren of Michigan to succeed the retiring attorney general.

Mr. Warren's nomination is now before the judiciary committee. The nomination probably will be given consideration next Monday.

The vote on Mr. Stone's nomination came after six hours of debate in open executive session, a somewhat unusual matter of considering executive appointments. Two democrats, two republicans and two farmer-labor senators voted against confirmation.
