

SAYS PROLONGED SESSION FACED AT PRESENT RATE

Speaker Burdick yesterday afternoon again urged the various committees to speed up business. "If this is not done we are likely to be here a week or two after the 40-day period," he declared.

Expediting matters, he called in a flock of bills, mostly for minor appropriations, and referred them to the committee on ways and means. "Unless house work is speeded up by the committees, we are likely to be here a week or two after the forty-day period," he declared.

Many Bills Passed The house during its afternoon session ground out a considerable list of minor measures. The following house bills were passed: No. 145, by Representative Miller, amending the law pertaining to the custody of school funds and the manner of disbursing them; house bill No. 275, enabling district courts of Multnomah county to use the circuit court panel along with a companion measure.

Pass Five Senate Bills The following senate bills were passed by the house: No. 24 eliminating Multnomah county from any supervision of the state engineer in matters of bridge construction; No. 66 fixing the salary of the treasurer of Wasco county at \$1000 a year and that of the county judge at \$1800; house bill 47, providing machinery for hearing veterans of the Spanish-American war under the state bonus act 63 referring to regulations in Wasco county on stock running at large; No. 101 giving to the veteran of any Indian war the taxation exemptions permitted to veterans of Oregon Indian wars.

FULL HOUSE FOR COLLEGE PLAYS

The reputation as a dramatic coach of Horace Rahekopf, head of the public speaking department of Willamette university, was unmistakably established when three one act plays, under his direction, were staged at Waller hall last night. The plays, given by members of the Theta Alpha Phi national dramatic fraternity, drew practically a full house.

Zelda Mulkey and Lloyd Walts had leading parts in the first and third plays. The first, "The Man on the Korb," was a tragedy in a London tenement district, and the two impersonated an English bookkeeper, broken in health, and his wife Mary. The third, "The Rider of Dreams," purported to be located in a negro shack in the south. In this play Leroy Walker and Willis Hawley, Jr., were added to the cast. In the first play Mr. Walts and Miss Mulkey were the sole actors.

"The Four Flushers," was a farce based on would-be high life in New York. Marriages, elopements and mythical fortunes were dealt with in rapid succession. Parts were taken by Palama Prouty, Richard Brize, Jack Vinson, Ruth Hewitt and Wallace Griffith. An orchestra played several numbers between acts.

PIERCE VEToes BILL TO PROVIDE WATER FOR BEND

Senate bill 65, which proposed a plan for furnishing water for the city of Bend, was yesterday vetoed by Governor Pierce. The bill provided that the city be given a right to take water from Tumalo creek, giving in exchange with an irrigation project the right to take water from Deschutes river. The exchange and delivery was to be through the main canal of the Deschutes county municipal improvement district.

"All of the water from Tumalo creek has been appropriated for use on the Tumalo project or on lands within the Deschutes county municipal improvement district," said the veto message. "The state has expended \$450,000 on the project and the district has expended an additional \$650,000. "The desert land board and the irrigation district now have control of the project and this bill does not authorize the board to approve the exchange. I am in full sympathy with the attempt of the city of Bend to acquire a pure water supply and will be glad to approve a bill granting the desert land board the right insofar as the state's interests are concerned to approve this transfer under proper terms. The existing rights of the Tumalo irrigation district cannot be taken away by legislation, but the city should have the right to secure its supply upon paying proper compensation to the district."

SENATE PASSES LENGTHY LIST OF BILLS FRIDAY

The following senate bills passed the senate yesterday: S. B. 22, Ritter—To permit irrigation districts under contract with the United States to cancel assessments levied to pay charges. S. B. 141, Clark (by request)—Providing for disposition of cases in justice courts when circuit court has concurrent jurisdiction. S. B. 28, Davis—Relating to liens on crops for water for irrigation and to provide for notice and record of such lien. S. B. 71, Davis (by request)—Fixing compensation of official court reporter.

S. B. 49, Upton—To establish Warner game refuge in Lake county, intended to preserve antelope. S. B. 29—Senator Davis and Representative Oakes—Providing for contracts by irrigation districts with the federal government in compliance with the fact finders' act and for assessment according to productive ability of lands in districts. The following house bills were passed by the senate: H. B. 14, Potter—Changing circuit court term in Lincoln county from August to September. H. B. 78, Multnomah delegation—To authorize the refund, with interest, to the general fund of Multnomah county of certain sums advanced for interstate bridge fund. H. B. 237, game committee—To establish wild bird and animal game reservation in Yamhill county. H. B. 176, Yamhill delegation—Placing bounty on squirrels in Yamhill county. H. B. 56, Fuller—Placing peace officers under workmen's compensation act. H. B. 106, game committee—Providing relief for Mrs. Gertrude J. Denny.

MEMORIALIZE CONGRESS ON TONGUE POINT BASE Congress will be called upon to provide necessary appropriations for carrying out the development of the Tongue Point naval base, under house joint memorial No. 11, introduced yesterday. The house resolutions committee introduced the measure, which points out the present unprotected state of the Columbia river mouth, the gateway of an empire comprising some 254,000 square miles.
