

### SCHOOL FARCE MAKES A HIT TO BE REPEATED

"Always in Trouble," the uproarious farce-comedy presented Friday and Saturday nights at the Popcorn school house by the Popcorn Parent-Teacher association and directed by Perry Prescott Heigelman, was well received by appreciative audiences. The people were kept in constant merriment from the rise of the curtain until the final scene by the clever jokes, the off-stage fights of Myster Moon, the hooded con, the jazz-time wedding and the exciting bomb explosion scene in the second act.

The farce, by Walter Ben Hare, is built for laughing purposes only and it kept everyone in a happy mood. The characters are all eccentric and their misunderstandings created a real atmosphere of fun. The scenes were played fast and smooth, the cues quickly taken up, and the characters well sustained.

The burden of the fun making fell on the shoulders of Fred Gibson, as Myster Moon, and his created gales of laughter by his efforts to collect five dollars and twenty-five cents from Gideon Blair, an old crabbid millionaire, played excellently by James Best. Gibson also made a hit with his singing of that popular song "Why Do You Do Me Like You Do?" Mrs. Fred Gibson, as Samantha Stede, the old maid, raised many good laughs by her clever impersonation.

Miss Alexa Churchill, as Lulu Esart, the rag-time, jazz-time lunch-counter girl, won applause by her characterization and her singing of the song "Me and My Boy Friend." Mrs. Roy McDowell, as Paula Maleek, the terrible Bolshevik, in pursuit of Tut with a dynamite bomb, carried her share of the laugh-making creditably. Cash Roberts, as Hiram Tut, always trying to escape from Paula Maleek, carried his part well. Miss Erma Simmons, as Rosebud Reese, granddaughter of Gideon Blair, gave a creditable performance, as did Ervin Simmons, as Tom Blase, the young college hero involved with Rosebud. Ralph Wilson, as Patrick Keller, the ticket taker for Blair's railroad who charged nine dollars war tax on a telegram, contained the character well. Mrs. James Best, as the flower girl in the jazz wedding scene, was good. Master Clark made his first appearance on any stage as the trainbearer for the jazz bride. May Darby and Mildred Simmons were good as companions for Rosebud.

Accompaniment for the songs and certain music was furnished by Miss Beth Bedford and violin solos between acts by Miss Gerth of this city.

Mrs. Guy McDowell, Mrs. Fred Gibson and Cash Roberts formed the play-producing committee for the association and their work on the many details helped decidedly to make the play a success.

"Always in Trouble" will be given at Annetville, Thursday night, and at Hayesville on Saturday night, instead of Friday night as formerly announced.

### PIERCE VETOES LINN HERD LAW

House bill 111, introduced by Swan of Linn county, was too sweeping in that it provided for tubercular inspection of all stock in Linn and not simply pure bred and valley dairy animals. Governor Pierce pointed out in his veto statement on the measure.

The governor expressed the opinion that there was not precedent in the law applying to beef cattle ranging in the Cascade mountains, thereby working an unnecessary handicap on stockmen.

The governor reported that he had signed house bill 43, providing for physical inspection of elementary school children; house bill 47 relating to the publishing of budgets by municipal corporations, and house bill 172 relating to the law covering real estate matters of a minor ward.

### TAX PROPOSED ON EMPLOYMENT AGENCIES IS HIT

House bill 252 providing for sharp increases in the license fees of employment agencies promises to find a considerable amount of opposition when it comes up for hearing in committee. A group of Portland employment agency operators came to Salem yesterday to seek a hearing before the committee on revision of laws. The session was postponed to Wednesday. Agents in cities of over 50,000 persons would be required to pay a license fee of \$500 and deposit a bond of \$3000. The present license fee is \$25 with a bond of \$750.

Omar Swenson, who headed a delegation of employment agency operators from Portland yesterday, declared, "The present license is probably too small as it allows irresponsible firms to enter too easily. However, the new schedule proposed, is far too high."

A proportionate schedule of increases is proposed in the measure for smaller cities of the state.

### CAESARIAN OPERATION SAVES LIFE OF BABE

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 10.—Out of the wreckage of a family, two members of which are dead, and one is dying as a result of an automobile collision, surgeons at a hospital here today saved the life of a seven pound baby boy by performing a Caesarian operation on his mother, pronounced fatally injured in the crash.

Sidney Kahn, 25, and his 13-month old child, were instantly killed when the automobile in which they and Mrs. Kahn were riding collided with another machine and the woman sustained a skull fracture and other injuries. Surgeons said would prove fatal in view of her apparently certain death. It was decided to operate immediately. The infant was born within an hour after the accident.
