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FORD TO OPERATE TRANS-ATLANTIC FLEET

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 11.—(By Associated Press.)—The Ford Motor company will enter trans-Atlantic shipping, operating its own fleet for carrying manufactured automobile parts to the company's foreign plants. It was announced today by Edsel Ford, president. The Ford company has purchased the steamer East India from the emergency fleet corporation as the first large unit in the proposed foreign service fleet.
