## JERSEY CALF CLUBS FORMED POLK COUNTY

Four thoroughbred Jersey calf clubs have been organized among the boys and girls of Polk county through the cooperation of the Polk County Jersey Breeders association and Josiah Willis, county school superintendent. The final work of organization was perfected Tuesday at a meeting held at the Isis theatre at Independence.

The four clubs launched are at Bethel, Greenwood, Independence and Elkins and the members are for the most part sons and daughters of Jersey breeders of the county.

S. L. Bryant is the leader of the Bethel club with Leslie Stewart as president, Harold Graves, vice president, and Rydar Finn, secretary.

The Greenwood club has W. B. Allen for leader and Derril Hewitt president, Harold Brower, vice president, and Mae Morrow, secretary.

Harold Reynolds is the leader for the Independence club with Edwin Frenn, president; Robert L. Hill, vice president and Carl Rust, secretary.

W. H. Hannum is leader of the Elkins club and William McElidowny, president; Jess Tedrow, vice president, and Earl Johnson, secretary.

## SILVER FALLS TIMBER MILLS CLOSE A WEEK

Silverton, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special.)—The green machines of the Silver Falls Timber company will be closed down Monday night for a week. The reason for the lay-off was given as lack of steady orders. There is also considerable discussion of beginning a five-day week schedule in order to retain as many men employed as possible.

At the February meeting of the parent-teacher circle a report was given on the child welfare work being carried on in Silverton schools. The report states that the milk bill came to approximately \$75 and the cracker bill to \$25. The circle plans on obtaining outside assistance in meeting the expense of these. A movement was also started to form a central welfare committee for local organizations.

The girls in the domestic art class under the supervision of Miss Sara Huntington at the Silverton high school, have begun on their spring dresses. A new feature of the work is that the girls are making each other's dresses. This method is used in order to give the girls an opportunity to learn to fit clothing on others. Miss Huntington considers this particularly good practice for future dressmakers. The class will hold an exhibit at a later date this spring.

The city of Silverton sold bonds to August B. McGuire at a premium of \$222.50 on \$20,000 bonds. The council also advertised a removal sale for the present water office building, bids will open February 23. Bids for the city hall will open March 2.

Shaw, inventor and author, slain with a sabre while the son was gun-mad, according to police. Mrs. Hazel Howard Brady, divorcee, whom young Shaw took home with him after a drunken orgy at a roadside, police allege, testified at the inquest. Bruce Shaw was attacked after he upbraided his son. With his last breath he pleaded for his son, who, he said, had been shell-shocked in France and was not accountable for his murderous impulses.

## TRIMBLE CHOSEN SUPERINTENDENT PYTHIAN HOME

Dallas, Or., Feb. 12.—Rev. and Mrs. C. F. Trimble, formerly of Dallas and now of Heppner, were selected by the Oregon-Washington Pythian home board to be superintendent and matron of the Pythian home at Vancouver, Wash. They will take up their duties on February 25.

This announcement was made public by Leif S. Finseth, prominent Pythian and member of the board on his return from the Portland meeting.

Rev. Mr. Trimble was pastor of the First Christian church in Dallas until last fall when he resigned. He later accepted the pastorate of the Christian church at Heppner. During approximately three years here he made many friends and had an especially strong following among the young people of the city and among the non-church members. He is a member of Marmon lodge No. 95 of Dallas.

The Pythian home, supported by the Oregon and Washington lodges is on a 12 1/2-acre tract in Vancouver, Wash., on the Pacific highway. It represents an investment of approximately \$200,000 and was opened for indigent Knights and Pythian Sisters and orphans of members in April, 1924. At the present time there are 27 men, five women and eight children in the home. The capacity is 60 and the number of inmates is increasing at a rate that will probably fill the institution within another year.

Mr. Trimble was selected from a group of five applicants for the position. The idea of service in the home was the principal reason for the acceptance of the position which will mean his retirement from the ministry.

The home has been under the supervision of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Rader of Walla Walla, Wash., since it was opened in 1924. A change in management was decided advisable by the board.

## DISSOLVE OLD POLK COUNTY FAIR BOARD

Dallas, Feb. 12.—It is proposed to dissolve the old Polk county fair association and turn back all fair buildings and property to Polk county to be administered by a county fair board appointed by the county court. A meeting of the association members has been called for Friday, February 20, at the Commercial club rooms when the proposal will be acted upon and other business transacted.

The meeting is the first step toward getting preparations for the 1925 fair underway. If the proposal to turn over the property of the association is approved by the stockholders the old association will dissolve as a corporation. The county court has appointed P. O. Powell, L. H. McLee and L. D. Brown as the fair board, and set aside \$1000 in the 1925 budget for the fair. A bill is pending in the legislature.
