"Vincennes" Is Coming Tomorrow

Under the direction of the better films committee of the Salem branch of the American Association of University Women an extensive advertising campaign has been waged for the past week to inform all club women that the third of the American Chronicles, released under the supervision of the Yale University Press, will be shown at the Liberty theater tomorrow and Saturday.

As the result of untiring efforts and with the cooperation of the local theater manager the A. A. U. W. has been successful in bringing "Columbus" and "James town," the first two of the series depicting the nation in the making, before Salem audiences. To bring the remainder of the series it will be necessary that each one is well supported.

With "Vincennes," the picture which will be shown tomorrow, will be presented also "Dandies," a David Belasco story with Mae Marsh in the starring role. According to those present at the previewing to these a clean-cut comedy that will please the most discriminating.

In "Vincennes" Yale University Press, with absolute fidelity has transferred to the screen the tremendous undertaking of George Rogers Clark and his little band of men in marching, in the dead of winter, over 240 miles of frozen wilderness, surprising the British and expelling them from the vast northwestern territory that later became the five states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan.

Fiction has never presented a more virile and magnificent hero than George Rogers Clark, the man who believed that nothing was impossible—and proved it. This splendid character in American history is portrayed by Leslie Austin. Governor Patrick Henry is characterized by William Walcott. Others in the important roles are Robert Callard, Percy Carr and Louis Reinhard. Edwin L. Hollywood directed.

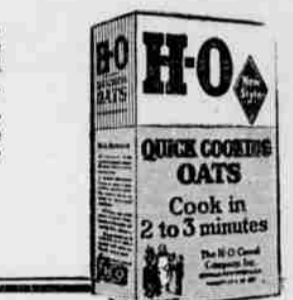
