

SEEK TO CHANGE LIBERTY STREET TO BROADWAY

Changing of the name of Liberty street to Broadway is soon to be advocated by property owners with abutting land, according to H. Poble, one of the business men whose business houses face Liberty street. That Broadway is the logical name for this artery of traffic is claimed by Mr. Poble, who points out that Liberty merges into Broadway near the location of the Wade store in the north end of Salem.

With Mr. Poble in this contention are Otto Klett and numerous other Liberty street business men. The firm of H. Poble & Sons plans a new building, similar to the one recently erected at 240 South Liberty. It will be a three story structure, 44 to 166 feet and will likely be numbered 244 S. Liberty until the name of the street is changed, says Mr. Poble. He is awaiting negotiations with possible tenants.

It is believed by property holders on the street that a bridge will be built across Mill creek on Liberty in connection with the bridge building program sponsored by Mayor J. B. Glessy. This would make it possible to route the Pacific highway through Salem on Liberty street and divert the heavy traffic from the Parrish school, according to Mr. Poble.

In looking up records, Mr. Poble found that the first brick building erected in Salem was the Wade store building on Broadway. The main part of the city of Salem was once located in that vicinity, but a contest over title to the land there waxed so hot that the city quietly moved up the river to its present site.
