Allowances by the ways and means committee last night included: State board of control—Recommended by budget commission \$20,000; allowed by ways and means \$25,000.

For transportation of insane and other wards—Recommended \$45,000; allowed \$39,500.

Child welfare commission—Recommended \$18,000; allowed \$20,000.

Inspectors of child labor—Recommended and allowed \$6750.

Board of conciliation—Recommended and allowed \$2000.

State board of health—Recommended \$55,000; allowed \$50,000.

Bureau of nursing—Recommended \$14,925; allowed \$14,000.

Board of eugenics—Recommended \$5000; allowed \$5000.

Bureau of child hygiene—Recommended \$10,565; allowed \$11,000.

Bureau of labor—Recommended and allowed \$15,500.

Weights and measures department—Recommended and allowed \$10,000.

State tax commission—Recommended and allowed \$45,000.

O. A. C. educational extension (Smith-Lever act)—Recommended and allowed \$62,601.

O. A. C. reimbursement for burned buildings—Requested
