N. W. Glee Club Well Received

The Northwestern university glee club, playing to a full house at the First Methodist church last night, established its reputation among the best college glee clubs to which the people of Salem have listened. The trend of the numbers used was distinctly high class, occasionally spiced with college songs of the popular type.

The program opened with a number of songs sung by the whole club. "The Old Songs," "Old College Clums," "Firelight Song," and "Land of Mine" were sung in quick succession, each winning hearty applause from the audience. John Elliott next gave two piano solos, much appreciated. The entire club, returning to the platform, sang "Come Again Sweet Love," "The Long Day Class" and "Northwestern Stands in Her Forest."

By far the outstanding voice of the group was that of Reilly K. Pease, baritone soloist and director of the club. He sang three solos, "Within This Sacred Dwelling," "Dannie Deever" and "America for Me," the last being in response to a vigorous encore.

Perhaps the best of all the ensemble numbers was "Blow Dingle Blow," an intricate selection which the club rendered virtually to perfection. A surprise was sprung when a song written by John R. Siles, Salem musician, was sung. The song, which was the only one sung by the club with the aid of music, was as well received as if the men had been practicing on it for weeks.

An unusual feature occurred when the program was turned over to Mrs. Anderson, manager of the club, whose home is in Salem. Mr. Anderson took time to make a short speech to the audience, saying, "I want you all to realize, as I do now, that you don't have to leave Salem to get the best there is."

The last numbers, sung by the entire club, were in eighty lighter vein than the others. "Push on Northwestern," "Friendship" and "Don't Send my Boy to Harvard," were all college songs, the third being the most humorous one of the evening. "Swing Along" and "The Bells of St. Mary's" next sung, were well received.

The concert closed with "Go You Northwestern" at which all alumni of Northwestern university rose to their feet.

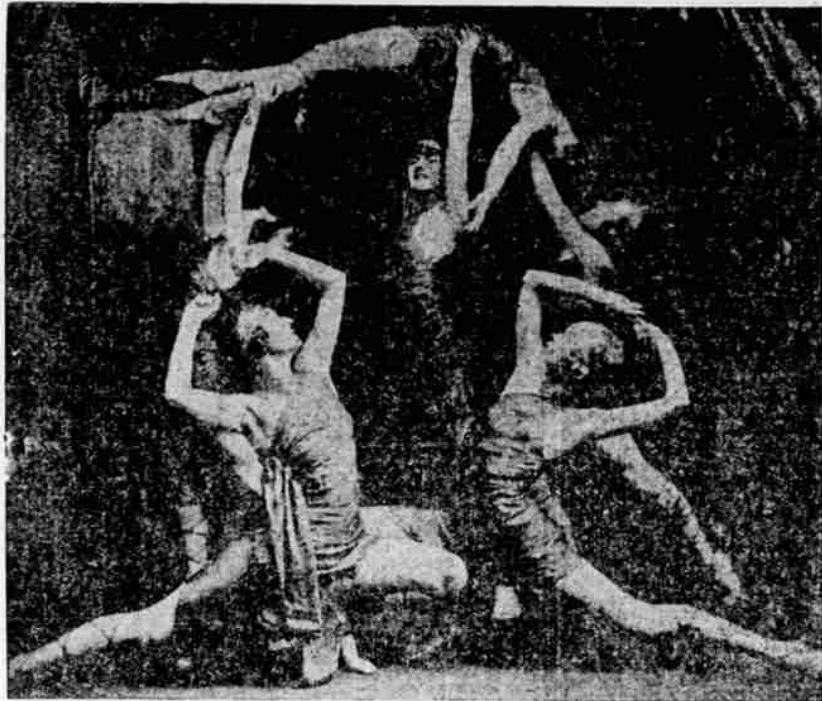
