

SALEM WINS FROM DALLAS BY 33 TO 13

The Salem high school basketball quintet defeated the Dallas five by a score of 33 to 13 on the Dallas floor last evening. The game was hard fought in the first half but the Dallas boys had a little hard luck in hitting the basket. They were unable to get started until the last few minutes of play when it was too late to overcome the big lead gained by the locals. The score at the end of the first half stood 14 to 6 in favor of the red and black five.

J. Drager for the locals was high point man of the game with two points. Hecman was second with 9 and Ellis third with eight. Dallas has a team of fast but small men and they were unable to break quick enough to penetrate the Salem defense. Shreve was high point man for the Dallas five with five points to his credit.

The locals will have two home games this coming week when they clash with the fast West Linn five on Wednesday evening and the Willamette freshmen Friday evening. The Willamette game will be played on the fresh floor. West Linn has a fast team and they gave Salem a good run until the last quarter when Salem forced ahead in a game played on the West Linn floor Wednesday. In a preliminary game the Salem high school seconds won from the Dallas seconds by a score of 26 to 13. A large number of rooters from Salem attended the game.

The Parish Junior high school basketball team won over the Monmouth players by a one sided score of 49 to 11. Blaco, center for the winners was by far the outstanding star. Kelly and Ecker were close seconds. Blaco had twenty markers to his credit. Kelly ten and Ecker nine. The Parish five will meet the Salem school next Wednesday evening and the Mill City team Friday night. Parish has a fast team this year, having lost only one game to date.

HOUSE ADOPTS 2 MEMORIALS

The house Friday afternoon adopted upon joint memorial No. 13, calling upon the federal government to establish a suitable memorial at the ocean end of Broadway in Seaside to mark the end of the Lewis and Clark expedition.

A memorial calling for Oregon's delegation in congress to work for the enactment of a bill in congress to authorize the federal government to build certain interstate roads was also adopted by the house.

DELAY ACTION ON DRY PROPOSAL

The house Friday afternoon postponed action on the reports of the two factions of the prohibition committee until Monday at 2 p. m. It is understood that a bill, which Representative Longman and Senator Hare are working on, will be ready for presentation before that time and will have a bearing on the prohibition question. A state constabulary to work in connection with the county officers would be provided under the measure.

AMERICANIZATION BILL TO COME UP NEXT WEEK

House bill 298, providing for Americanization work in the state under the state superintendent of public instruction will likely be reported out by the ways and means committee early next week. An open meeting was held on the measure Wednesday night when Catherine Bradshaw of Portland, an executive of the Americanization council, appeared to argue for the bill. Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill also spoke on the question. The measure calls for an annual appropriation of \$10,000 for carrying on Americanization work.

MANY WARS IN PORTUGAL

Lisbon.—The uncertainties of politics in the life of the state, are pointed out by a local newspaper which recounts 20 armed uprisings in the country since 1911. Also seven attempted uprisings were successfully resisted. In the nine years since 1915 Portugal has had seven presidents, and 40 different cabinets.

Amnest—Bill Hiler, Austin, Texas, Feb. 14.—The amnesty bill restoring political rights to James E. Ferguson, former governor, passed last week by the state senate, was held unconstitutional in an opinion announced Friday by Attorney General Dan Moody. The opinion was prepared at the request of the house of representatives.

WAR MINES STILL MENACE IS BELIEF

Amsterdam.—Twenty thousand deep sea mines are slowly rising to the surface in the Baltic and are becoming a formidable menace to shipping, according to A. Flaes, Netherlands consul-general in Hamburg.

In a report published here recently Mr. Flaes says that during the war 60,000 mines were laid between Bergen, Norway, and the Baltic archipelago. Forty thousand of them have been recovered in some way or another; mostly, it is assumed, through the chains by which they were secured being gradually eaten away by the action of the sea water. The rest are still unaccounted for, and they are reappearing gradually in unexpected places. The consul gives warning that the Baltic, the Bothnian Gulf and the Finnish waters will not be entirely mine-free for a long time to come.

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COMMITTEE TO STUDY WORKMAN INSURANCE

It provides that the committee shall be composed of the speaker of the house, three representatives, the president of the senate and two senators. 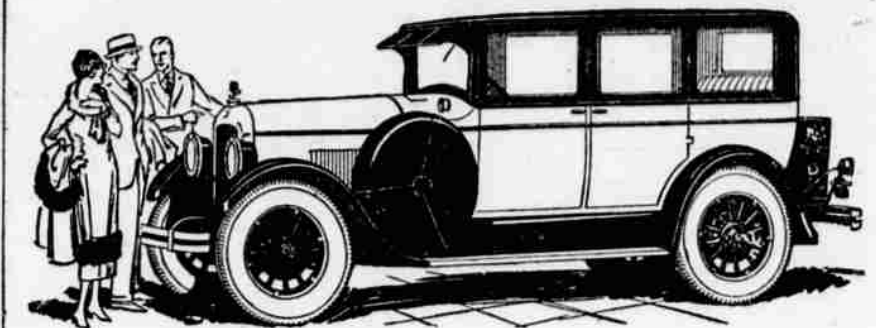
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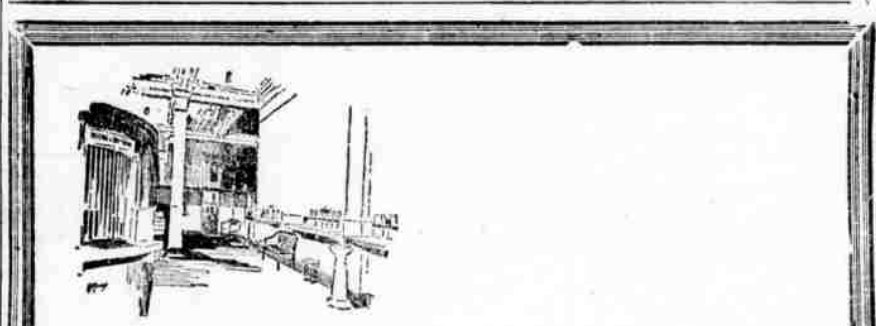
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
