Under the reign of czars it was a crime the penalty being imprisonment and in many cases banishment for life to Siberia for ministering to the adherents of the Russian church. Hunters have been imprisoned and several have been banished to Siberia for this in the hundreds of years past. Russia is now having its first period of religious liberty in its history of 1000 years or more. This is denied from some quarters and incidents are cited of missionaries being persecuted and given a hard time to escape from the country. The reason for their being driven from the country will be told by Dr. Hunter in his discourse. Literally hundreds of Russian people are hearing the gospel for the first time and responding to its invitation to accept Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. Many of them walk from five to fifty miles to hear the missionary and the heart-rending appeals for missionaries and bibles comes to the ears almost from every village and city the missionary visits. 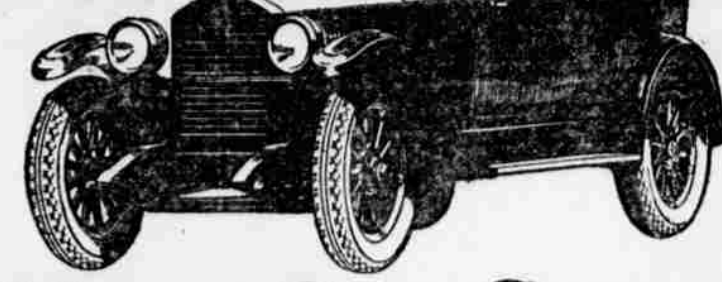
