WESTERN FRUIT GIVEN SEND OFF IN MINNESOTA

Silverton, Or., Feb. 15.—(Special.)—Western fruit received a red send-off at Duluth, Minnesota, so Rev. George Henriksen, who has returned from the middle western state, reports.

Rev. Mr. Henriksen went to Minneapolis, Minn., about two weeks ago to attend a ministerial conference held there. He was accompanied by John G. Goplerud, president of the Silverton Food Products company, a co-operative cannery at Silverton. Mr. Goplerud in turn, was accompanied by two cans of Silverton strawberries. At the close of the conference, the Rev. Mr. Henriksen claimed one of the cans and started for Duluth to visit a brother who is a Duluth business man. Fine fruit buyers for large concerns were gathered together. A number of dishes were numbered and into these were poured strawberries put up by various cannery concerns. The nine men tasted these. Eight of the men pronounced the dish bearing the Silverton number far superior in flavor. In fact the buyers were so sincere in favoring the western berry that they immediately set about trying to get in touch with Mr. Goplerud before he should leave the east. Rev. Mr. Henriksen reports that he, Mr. Goplerud, was finally reached at Fargo, N. D., but that as he had not yet returned from there, the immensity of the order which the Silverton company will receive is not yet known.

SILVERTON FIVE DEFEATS DALLAS

Silverton, Or., Feb. 15.—(Special.)—After losing two games—one to Molalla and one to Dallas—the Silverton team again picked up and came to the fore Friday night when it defeated Dallas at Silverton with a score of 24 to 19.

The game was a fight from beginning to end, being rather rough. However, the first half was by far the most interesting, ending in a score of 19 to 10.

Kenneth Benson of Silverton acted as referee. But a small crowd was on to witness the game.

The lineup for Silverton was Quill, Moser, Latham, Otto Alm, Carson, Henry Alm for O. Alm and Kennedil for Carson. The Dallas lineup was Curtis, Williams, Carver, Farley and Boydton, with Wiek for Carver. Latham was high point man with 15 points to his credit.

A preliminary game was played between the high school seconds and the high school independents, resulting in a victory for the independents with a score of 19 to 15.

The next event at Silverton for basketball fans will be the triple-header to be staged here Wednesday night. The Newberg high school boys and girls will play the Silverton teams. As yet the Silverton girls have not been defeated this season.

The real drawing card for Wednesday night will be the game between the Newberg and the Silverton faculties. Much amusement was reported from Newberg when the Silverton faculty members were defeated there with a score of 22 to 12. It is said the referee was real kind in his decisions and lined up no fouls. The Silverton lineup was: Coffe and Reed, forwards; Long and Cunningham, guards; Kamp, center.

The first half ended with the score standing 23 to 9 in favor of the northerners. Saturday night being his first attempt to work in with the varsity team, Herzen, put in in Scott's place, did slightly better, although he tried hard to star.
