

SCHOLARSHIP FOR BEST ESSAY UPON HIGHWAYS

Washington, Feb. 16.—An offer of four years at college with all expenses paid is contained in the announcement made here today by the highway education board of the sixth annual good roads essay contest, in which all high school students are eligible to participate.

In line with administration policies tending toward economy, students are being requested to write essays on the subject "Economics Resulting from Highway Improvement," having in the two preceding years written papers on subjects dealing with highways and religion and highways and home life.

The contest in the various states usually is sponsored by one of the leading universities or the state department of education, which aids in the announcement of the contest and at its termination names competent judges to determine the best essay from that state. This applies also to the District of Columbia and the outlying territories.

The principal prize is a four years' university scholarship, offered by H. S. Firestone of Akron, Ohio, a member of the highway education board, of which the United States commissioner of education, Dr. J. J. Tigert, is chairman.

TAKE DANCING OUT OF RITUAL

New York, Feb. 16.—The withdrawal of dancing as a part of the expression of the religious program of St. Mark's-on-the-Bowery was announced at yesterday's vesper services of the church by Dr. William Norman Guthrie, rector. Consideration for "our fellow churchmen who cannot see their way to trust us with this great and holy instrument of religious evocation," was given by Dr. Guthrie as the principal reason for eliminating the ceremonies.

The introduction of "pagan rites" and expressive liturgical dances into the services of St. Marks caused an open break between rector and Bishop William T. Manning of the Episcopal diocese about a year ago.

A service combining the ritual of Anglicans, occidental Catholics and eastern Catholics was held in the morning at St. Marks. Dr. Guthrie said it was the first of the kind in church history. He described the service as a rhythmic oratorio embodying all the colors of the rainbow and the aurora borealis; all the sounds that can be expected of a male choir, singing against an organ equipped with a tom-tom and castanets; and screen views of nearly all the symbolic personages in mythology, except cupid and the missing link.

Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, New York City, and one of America's foremost educators, has undergone an operation there for glaucoma of the right eye, a disease affecting the eyeball. GUARD TO CAMP NEAR MEDFORD

A tract of 8000 acres in Jackson county, northeast of Medford and extending a distance of six miles along Rogue river, will be the site this summer of the encampment of the Oregon national guard. Brigadier General White received approval of the location Saturday from the war department. For several years Oregon troops have trained at Camp Lewis.

The latter part of June has been selected as the time for the encampment, and while about 2700 men are in attendance in Jackson county the coast artillery troops will be in training at Fort Stevens, according to present plans of the adjutant general, instead of at Fort Barry, Cal.

intendent of the juvenile hall and referee of the juvenile court of Los Angeles since 1917.

Dr. Van Waters is president of the mental hygiene organization of Los Angeles. This organization is responsible for the successful

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termination of the effort to bring the child guidance clinic to Los Angeles. This important extension of the child welfare movement has recently been established here under the auspices of the commonwealth fund, an organization similar in aim to the Rockefeller Foundation. The purpose of the clinic is to solve the problems of the child who has been subjected to abnormal conditions, by finding and ameliorating or removing those conditions. The clinic will be subsidized for one year and will be turned over to the city for continuance.

On account of this new public welfare activity local organizations are joining in sponsoring a series of lectures and conferences with Dr. Van Waters as the principal speaker. Those interested in her visit and under whom she will appear while in the city are: Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, public welfare department; American Association of University Women, Oregon branch of the National League of Women Voters, the Woman's Army and Navy League of Portland, the Council of Jewish Women and the Portland Grade Teachers' association.

Special interest attaches to Dr. Van Waters' visit because she is a former Oregon girl, having obtained her A. B. and A. M. at the University of Oregon. She secured her Ph. D. at Clark university. She was instructor in philosophy at the University of Oregon in 1909, assistant director of the
