SIGURD NILSSON TO GIVE CONCERT AT SILVERTON

Silverton, Or., Feb. 17.—(Special.)—Silverton music lovers are very enthusiastic over the coming concert by Sigurd Nilsson, the bass member of the De Rosette quartet which will appear at the Portland auditorium on February 26. Mr. Nilsson will sing at Silverton on the evening of February 25.

It is but seldom that Silverton has the opportunity of hearing one of the widely known artists without leaving home. This opportunity comes because Mr. Nilsson is a former Silvertonian and because he has a sister and father who still make Silverton their home. The father is P. Nelson and the sister is Mrs. John Elder. Mr. Nilsson planned on visiting his father and sister and when Silverton learned of this she immediately set about to try to get Mr. Nilsson in consent to giving a concert. This he consented to do, Mrs. Gertrude Cameron will act as accompanist and the local order of the Loyal Legion is making arrangements. Although final details have not yet been arranged, it is understood that the concert will be given at the Eugene Field auditorium.

The program will consist of such a variety that it will please all. For the classic there is the Italian group which will open the program. This will be followed by a group of Norwegian and Swedish folk songs, a tribute to the Scandinavian element at Silverton. Mr. Nilsson being himself a Scandinavian. There will also be a group of negro spiritual songs. To close the program Mr. Nilsson will sing a number of lighter songs, all of which are old favorites.

ASKS MONEY FOR BRIDGE SURVEYS

A request for \$500 from the city treasury was made last night by Fred A. That several new bridges would be involved in this building program was attested by Mr. Erickson when pressed by Alderman Wenderoth.

THIRTY THREE BILLS GO THRU HOUSE MONDAY

The house ground through a mass of bills in fast time yesterday afternoon, disposing of most of them with little argument. Thirty-three house bills were passed. Two bills were killed, several re-referred and a number taken from the table for further committee action.

House bill 249 providing for a refund of tax penalties for the years 1921, 1922 and 1923, providing that the original amounts were paid prior to December 31, 1924, was killed. The bill was designed to help farmers, who in some sections of the state are delinquent in taxes on account of poor crops or low prices. The bill however, could make no special classification, and took in all taxpayers.

House bill 436 amending the probate court code was also slaughtered.

Included in bills passed were: H. B. 230, providing that bail forfeiture for traffic arrests by state traffic officers go to the state treasurer; 346 creating stock district No. 1; 352, correcting defects in the law pertaining to the transfer from counties to municipalities of property taken for taxes; 223, permitting the state highway commission to acquire through gift, purchase or condemnation land adjacent to or in proximity of highways with the view of saving scenic spots; 374 a companion measure for correcting the law in case house joint resolution No. 6 done away with the swearing in of voters at the polls is adopted; house bill 384, regulating the distribution of election tickets with recommended candidates names on them; 132, tightening up the law pertaining to the licensing of real estate brokers and their operations; 209, adding to the regulations now in force for forest protection; 200, permitting Medford to take its water supply from Big Butte creek; 493, exempting vessels registered with their home ports in Oregon from state taxation; 213, amending the procedure for the escheat of property, money and other belongings to inmates of state institutions; 179, providing for the holding of teachers' institutes of from one to two days duration, Multnomah county being excluded from the provisions of the measure; 173, excluding from the commercial motor vehicle transportation law provisions, trucks used exclusively for hauling farm produce, machinery, or supplies; 243, providing for creation of the office of meat and herd inspector in Benton county.

House bill 205, extending school

districts of the third class from the requirement of preparing a budget; 291, providing a penalty of from \$50 to \$100 fine or imprisonment of from ten days to one year in jail for fraudulently changing a license plate on an automobile; 422, providing for the deposit of the uninvested portion of the J. T. Apperson agricultural college fund; 424, making it the duty of prosecuting attorneys to press cases in connection with violations of the engineers' registration law; 425, prohibiting the sale of other than standard fire hose couplings and hydrant fittings in Oregon; 187, creating a board to license chiropractors and giving the board power of regulation; 292, providing for the filing with the secretary of state names of chauffeurs or for hire car operators convicted of traffic regulations; 215, setting the pay of Polk county commissioners at \$5 a day and 10 cents a mile traveled in performance of their duties; amending about \$63 acres of Polk county to Lincoln county on account of a road situation existing; 228, providing a uniform system of the transfer of corporation stock; 411, pertaining to less regulations in connection with the enforcement of the horticulture code in connection with infested orchards or fields; 152, covering the method of tax payment in drainage districts; 72, repealing sections of the law requiring the licensing of persons doing plumbing work as the law pertains to cities of over 4000 persons; 349, requiring trappers in Yamhill county to obtain permits from the county court before setting traps and compelling trappers to inspect their traps every 24 hours; 434, pertaining to issuance of warrants on irrigation districts; 437, authorizing county courts and the state highway commission to issue permits for the construction of toll roads and 231, pertaining to the system of transferring property on which there is a soldiers' bonus loan and setting down regulations for foreclosure of junior mortgages.
