Women to Hear Dr. Brown

All women of Salem and of the county, society, club women and "stay at home" will be interested tomorrow in the talk which Dr. Walter H. Brown, director of the five year Marion county health demonstration, will give before an open meeting of the Salem branch of the National League of Women Voters in the public library commencing at 2:30.

This will be the first opportunity offered to the women of the county to hear a definite description of the aims, purposes and methods of procedure of the health program. Dr. Brown has given numerous talks before men's organizations but has not yet addressed in a body the mothers of the children who will be primarily benefited through the health work.

The Salem league is sponsoring the meeting and Mrs. J. A. Churchill, president, will be in charge. All women whether or not they belong, or having any intentions of joining the league, are asked to attend the open meeting in the library tomorrow.

Since the organization of the Salem division of the national league late in January, numerous study groups have been formed and the active study of the first series of the lessons sent out by the central organization has been started. The league which exists for the purpose of educating women to vote intelligently as well as honestly taken up in turn the study of the local, state and national government. The first of the series is "Know Your Town," and in line with thorough understanding the effect which the health demonstration will have on this community the officers of the league have asked Dr. Brown to address the first open meeting.
