

### GAME BILL PUT ON TABLE; TO BE KILLED IN HOUSE

Along with a half dozen or more other proposals to shear Governor Pierce of the prerogatives of his office the bill to transfer the power of appointing the members of the state game commission to the board of control.

For days this bill, passed by the house with better than a two-thirds majority, has been hanging fire in the senate while its friends maneuvered about to gain the required 20 votes to pass it over the veto in the senate. Their principal stick in the mud was the argument that they wished to insure the retention of I. N. Fieischner, whose term expires February 25, on the commission, Monday morning Governor Pierce announced the re-appointment of Mr. Fieischner.

Monday afternoon when house bill 193, the game commission bill, was reached on the senate calendar it was laid on the table. The program now calls for its return to the house and its quiet burial there.

### TOLL ROAD BILL PASSES HOUSE

A toll road between Tillamook and a point on the east side of the Coast range toward Forest Grove is likely to be built during the next few years, thereby bringing Portland some 40 miles nearer to the Pacific beaches, according to Representative Winslow, Tillamook county, who explained house bill 437 to the house members before its passage yesterday afternoon. The bill would permit the state highway commission and county commissioners to authorize toll roads.

### REWARDS FOR GLOBE FLIERS

Washington, Feb. 17.—The feat of the army fliers who first encompassed the globe by air would be rewarded under a bill passed by the house substantially as a record mentioned by the war department.

After an hour's wrangle over attempts to amend, the house approved without a rollcall the measure carrying both material and honorary rewards in recognition of the achievement.

The bill would advance Captains Smith 1000 fliers on the army promotion list and lieutenant Wade, Arnold and Nelson 500 fliers each. Commissions as second lieutenants in the regular army would be given Second Lieutenants Ogden and Harding of the reserve corps. The measure also provided for award of the distinguished service medal to each and for their acceptance of foreign decorations.

The bill was amended to award the distinguished service medal also to Major Frederick L. Martin, the original world flight commander, forced to abandon his plane in Alaska, and to Sergeant Harvey, his mechanic.

### PARKED ON TRACK RIDE COSTS \$67

San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 17.—Hugo Jamieson of San Mateo must pay the Southern Pacific company \$67.72 for tearing the pilot from a steam locomotive. Justice of the Peace Weber awarded the railroad that amount yesterday.

Testimony showed that Jamieson parked his machine on the railroad tracks and composed himself for a quiet nap.

The court chided the defendant for his carelessness in falling asleep on the railroad tracks.

The crew of the train testified that they had been forced to awaken Jamieson after the locomotive had carried him 99 feet. Jamieson was uninjured.

### KINDERGARTEN BILL TO BE CONSIDERED

The kindergarten bill, introduced by Representative Woodward and others and Senator Joseph's bill to change the probate court system in Multnomah county, both of which were defeated in the senate a few days ago, were reconsidered yesterday. The kindergarten bill was re-referred to the committee on education and the Joseph bill was tabled. Joseph said he would not bring the bill up today, but will await advice from Multnomah county circuit.
