

DALLAS PAVES TWO BLOCKS OF LYLE STREET

Dallas, Or., Feb. 18.—Decision was made to lay two additional blocks of blacktop paving by the city council at its regular meeting Monday night. The improvement would be on Lyle street from Ash to Burch streets to connect the present paving with the Dallas Machine & Locomotive Shops and the Willamette Valley Lumber company yards and mill.

March 9 was set as the date for hearing remonstrances against the proposed improvement. In the discussion of the report of Engineer Semon it was brought out that the cost of paving a full width blacktop street, or an 15-foot concrete strip would be approximately the same. The macadam base of the street is suitable for use with little filling. The council voted unanimously in favor of the full-width paving.

The plan of J. C. Compton is still in effect in Dallas and it is expected that he will bid on the job. An issue of \$17,571.55 sewer bonds issued under the Bannock bonding act to cover property in the Maple street sewer district was sold to the Ladd & Tilton bank of Portland at \$104.34. The issue was bid upon by four Portland bond houses and banks with offers ranging from \$106.65 to the high bid of Ladd & Tilton. The low bid was submitted by Freeman, Smith & Camp company with a note of explanation attached that past experience had proved that Dallas redeemed her bond issues too rapidly to be worth the top price. Other bids were Blythe, Witter company, \$127.57; Lumberman's Trust company, premium of \$53.53; Ralph Schneelock company, \$103.58; and Western Bond & Mortgage company, \$103.52.

Councilman Black announced that the auditor of the county books had discovered where the city had been overpaid on its road fund by \$300 in 1924, due to the issuance of a check which had not been recorded by the county treasurer, who had later issued another check covering the same amount and additional money that had accrued in the fund.

The matter of children skating on the street came up for discussion and the decision reached that the practice should be curbed before someone is seriously injured by automobiles.
