

### SENATE REJECTS GARLAND-KINNEY CIGARETTE BILL

Senate bill No. 119, the Garland-Kinney cigarette bill, which was designed to prohibit the advertising of cigarettes on billboards and along public highways, was defeated in the senate yesterday after a spirited debate.

Senator Garland flayed the smokers of cigarettes and shamed "the women of America" for using them. Referring to the alluring pictures advertising cigarettes along the highways he asserted that "the devil is in them."

Senator Upton, main opposing speaker, declared that the bill was aimed at Foster & Kleiser, billboard advertisers and that it was unfair because it allowed advertising in newspapers and magazines. The vote on the bill was as follows:

For—Beals, Brown, Eddy, Fisk, Garland, Kinney, LaFollett, Miller, Haples, Toose, Zimmerman.

Against—Banks, Butler, Garrier, Clark, Corbett, Davis, Dennis, Dunn, Hall, Johnson, Klepper, Maglady, Rittner, Strayer, Taylor, Upton, Moser.

Absent—Hare and Joseph.

House bill 371, the Shelton measure designed to curb usury, was defeated after a warm debate, but will be reconsidered today.

Considerable debate was required before the Bates house bill providing to submit to the people the proposal to establish a normal school at Seaside went to vote, and the measure carried. Clark and Kinney led out in its support while Garland supported it "to encourage the young legislator who introduced it and who is ambitious and clean." Banks supported it for the same reason.

Senator Johnson opposed the bill, declaring that the state had gotten into the throes of another normal school battle that would not be finished at this session of the legislature. He said that the state voters would vote for a normal school at Seaside, "because the facilities for it are not here." He thought he could support the bill if the location were Astoria instead of Seaside.

Johnson's reference to Astoria caused Upton, in his defense of the bill, to declare that it would be better for the young women "to live down by the sounding sea than among the fish, fins and mud-flats of Astoria." This comment from Upton later in the afternoon brought him a rebuke from Mrs. Kinney, who arose in question of personal privilege.

Senator Toose supported the bill reluctantly, declaring that the bill passed yesterday for a normal school in eastern Oregon and also the Seaside bill were mistakes.

Beals, Eddy, Hare, Johnson, LaFollett and Zimmerman voted against the bill.

### 18 HOUSE BILLS PASS IN SENATE

Eighteen house bills were approved by the senate Wednesday afternoon, as follows:

H. B. 104, Harburt—Increasing penalty for operating stills.

H. B. 106, Swan—Placing more stringent regulations on licensing dance halls.

H. B. 137, (sub. for H. B. 89) committee on game—Permitting beavers to be taken in certain districts.

H. B. 112, Kilham—Creating reconstruction fund for public buildings destroyed by fire.

H. B. 130, committee on horticulture—Increasing salary of secretary of state board of horticulture.

H. B. 314, Kilham—Providing for increase in salary of state printer from \$2400 to \$3200.

H. B. 318, Winslow—Increasing salary of county treasurer of Tillamook county.

H. B. 74, King—Increasing salary of county officer.

H. B. 215, Fuller—Providing expenses for Polk county commissioners.

H. B. 404, Linn county delegation—Increasing salaries of Linn county officials.

H. B. 218, Coffey—Requiring counties of not less than 75,000 population to levy a tax for purpose of erecting buildings upon county fair grounds, for erection of buildings at Gresham.

H. B. 256, Tucker—Requiring that both men and women applying for marriage licenses shall furnish certificates that they are free from venereal diseases.

H. B. 359, Miller and Bettelner—Placing Ben on land on which nursery stock is set out.

H. B. 184, Fuller—Providing manner in which county commissioners shall present claims for pay.

H. B. 21, joint committee on roads and highways—Providing that trucks registered on or after April 1 may pay only three-fourths of license fee.

H. B. 247, Hercher—Correcting act relative to operators of motor vehicles.

H. B. 224, Representative Ford and Senator Hill—Authorizing highway commission to sell bonds.

Washington, Feb. 19.—Evidence of President Coolidge's "economy at home" plan began to appear today while employees in the White House offices waited to learn the winner in the ten-dollar prize money economy contest conducted by N. P. Webster, disbursing clerk of the office, in an endeavor to ascertain ways and means of cutting expenses.

The items of economy already noted about White House offices include:

Reduction from 175 to 89 in the number of towels rationed daily to the five washrooms in the offices.

Substitution of a common drinking glass for individual paper cups at the drinking fountains in the corridors.

Orders to turn out all lights whenever not needed.

Reluctance of employees to extend loans for an indefinite period of pencils to newspaper correspondents, who since time immemorial, have depended upon this unfailing source of supply.

Use over and again of the large manila envelopes in which messengers carry documents to and from the various departments.

These, however, are only a start on the economy which Mr. Webster declares must be instituted if the saving of \$12,500 demanded by Mr. Coolidge is accomplished the coming fiscal year.

### RELIEF OWNER TO FIGHT SUIT

Charles F. Schaub, owner of the river steamer Relief, was in Salem yesterday. The Relief is now tied up in the Willamette slough under arrest by federal authorities, awaiting the outcome of a law suit filed by the Globe and Rutgers Fire Insurance company to collect the sum of \$3,245.76 and costs. That amount of money is alleged to have been spent by the company raising the ship after it was allowed to sink by its owners. The case is set for March 2 in the federal court at Portland.

With Schaub were O. P. Graham a builder of launches in Portland, and A. D. Platt, an attorney of that city. Schaub is quoted as stating that he intends to fight the present lawsuit to the finish, a Portland bank having confidence in his side of the argument, and agreeing to furnish any money that might be needed.

In the mean time the boat will have a federal guard placed upon it to see that it is not molested in any way.
