

ROBIN HOOD TO BE PLAYED AT GRAND SUNDAY

RUBBER TILING FOR ELKS CLUB

The very newest type of public utility floor covering, rubber tiling, has been procured for the greater part of the new Elks building, according to H. W. Meyers, chairman of the furnishing committee of the lodge. This covering will be of a check board, gray and black, marbled grain insert, three-sixteenths inch rubber and will cover the floor of the lobby, coat rooms, card room, billiard room and buffet corridor of the first floor and the corridor, ante-room, card room and main lobby of the second floor.

Linoleum and Wilson rugs will be used to cover floors in the remainder of the building. The finish of all woodwork will be Philippine mahogany. Leather on all the upholstery will be a mahogany grain of Spanish leather.

The most beautifully furnished billiard room in the state is provided in Mr. Meyers' plan. More than \$50,000 will be expended on the interior of the Elks temple, says Mr. Meyers. Contracts have been closed with the H. F. Stiff Furniture company, the United States Rubber company and the Brunswick, Balke, Collender company for a share of the furnishings.

CRAZED BY DRUGS KILLS 6 PEOPLE

Guaymas, Sonora, Mexico, Feb. 21.—Grazed from smoking marijuana, Escrado valle, 27, a former member of the marine corps of the Mexican army, ran amuck today in a hospital with a butcher knife and killed six people before he could be subdued.

Valle was employed at the hospital, and according to stories told by the police, he went to the kitchen of the hospital and seized a butcher knife and stabbed the cook and attendant, and then ran into one of the wards and stabbed and killed four patients before he was felled by another hospital employee.

Police say that after he was taken to the jail and quipped by denied all knowledge of the affair and protested he was innocent.

As this is the second case of a marijuana addict running amuck in Guaymas in the past year the police have redoubled their efforts to stop the traffic in the drug.

BRITISH WOMEN MUST WAIT UNTIL 30 TO VOTE

London, Feb. 21.—(By Associated Press.)—The bill to put women on a political equality with men by granting them the vote at the age of 21, instead of the present age of 30, was killed in the house of commons this afternoon when the house refused it the second reading by a vote of 220 against 153. The amendment, offered by Sir William Joynson-Hicks, the home secretary, to postpone franchise reform action until later in the life of the present parliament was carried.

New York, Feb. 21.—Inez Hayes Irwin, wife of Will Irwin, the writer, was awarded first prize in the sixth annual short story contest conducted by the O. Henry memorial committee, it was announced. Her story, "The Spring Flight," was adjudged the best published during 1924. The prize is \$500.

Chester Crowell, was awarded second prize, \$250, for his story, "Margaret Blake," while Frances Newman, author of "Rachel and Her Children," received \$100, the third prize.

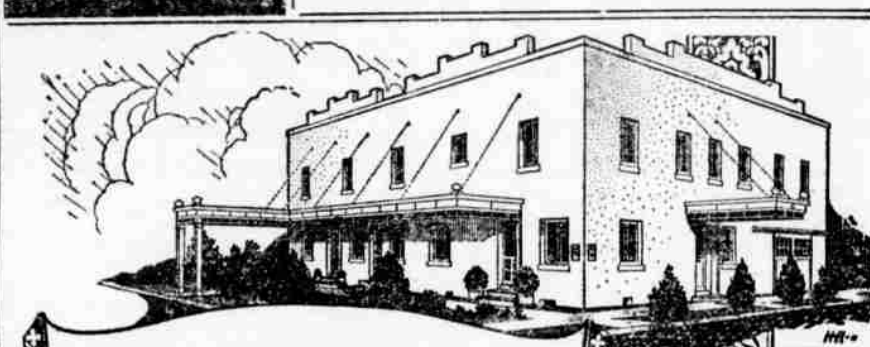
