

FIGHT FORSEEN ON INSURANCE BILLS PENDING

Enough insurance legislation is now pending in the legislature to cause a considerable war before the session comes to a close. Senator Carner has introduced the bill that will increase the gross premium taxes of insurance companies from 2.5 to 2.5 per cent. The bill that will be backed by the ways and means committee.

There is also expected to be a considerable scrap in the house over senate bill 146, introduced by Klepper, which provides that foreign mutual casualty companies may write automobile insurance in Oregon. The terms and conditions under which they could do it are the same under which the state of Massachusetts permits foreign mutual casualty companies to write auto insurance there.

BILL RAISING RECORDERS PAY TO \$1500 PASSES

The salary of Mildred Robertson Brooks, Marion county recorder, is increased from \$1200 to \$1500 a year by house bill 417 which passed the senate Saturday afternoon at the pay of the county commissioners is increased from \$4 to \$5 and expenses while on county business.

Passage of the bill was accompanied by considerable picturesque language, including a personal set-to between Senators LaFollet and Brown of Marion county which defied all parliamentary procedure. LaFollet was against the bill and Brown for it. The bill was introduced by the Marion county delegation in the house.

Senator Staples fought the bill on the floor. "By the jumpin' broad-axe," shouted Staples, "this is getting entirely beyond us. I opened this gate, but by Godfrey, now that I've opened it I'm going to stand here and see that no one gets through it."

Staples' remark that he had opened the gate had reference to the bill introduced by him to increase the salaries of the supreme court judges from \$5250 to \$7500 a year, which has passed both houses.

Many negative votes were heard on the Marion county salary bill, but most of them were changed to ayes before the result of the vote was announced.

WANTS COMMISSION TO STUDY SCHOOL COURSES

Senator Eddy has introduced a concurrent resolution providing that the governor appoint a commission to make an investigation in the next two years of the courses of study in Oregon schools. The resolution does not specify the number of members to comprise the commission, but provides that not more than one shall be a professional educator. The resolution is a result of the defeat of Eddy's school bill.

GOVERNOR DAVIS HELD UNDER BAIL OF \$1000

Topeka, Kan., Feb. 23.—Former Governor J. M. Davis and Carl J. Peterson, former state bank commissioner, were bound over to the district court today, following preliminary hearing before Judge Clyde Cowgill. Each furnished bond of \$1000. They are charged with soliciting a bribe in connection with an application for a pardon for Walter Grundy, convicted Atchison banker.
