Returning leave Mill City at 2:05 p. m., making connection with the motor car from Albany arriving at Detroit at 5 p. m.

ARREST INDIAN GRAVE VANDALS

Mariposa, Cal., Feb. 24.—Raymond D. Silkwood and his wife, Jennie, approached the superior court here today to go to trial on a charge of desecrating human graves.

The charges are the result of a raid by deputy sheriffs on the Mountain View roadhouse, near here, said to be operated by Silkwood. A sack, containing charred bones, heads, arrow heads and other articles was seized, the charges said.

The material is alleged to have been taken from the Mariposa Indian burial grounds near the Mountain View resort.

Chief Joe Howard, of the Mariposa Indian tribe, brought the charges. He believes that rewards offered by museums and numismatists for old Spanish and California coins, said to be buried with some of the later chieftains, was the motive.

SALEM PLAYS INDEPENDENCE THERE TONIGHT

Tonight the Salem high school basketball team will journey to Independence to meet the high school team. The locals won over them in a former game earlier in the season by a score of 21 to 3 and a win over them tonight will eliminate them for the district honors.

Salem has been handicapped the last week by the loss of Ellis and John Drager who have been out of the lineup on account of sickness, but both of them are up and expected to be back in uniform for this evening's game. Independence kept the locals out of the state tournament last year and Salem will play hard to get revenge. The Independence five uses the "practising" basketball system which allows the game considerably and keeps the score down. Last year the game at Independence ended 6 to 3 in favor of the locals.

The red and black five have been hitting the hoop with regularity and are almost a cinch to copy the district honors which will allow them to play in the state tournament, held under the auspices of the Willamette university. Salem has a good chance to win the state title if they work hard. Franklin high of Portland is considered the strongest team in the state and the locals only lost to them by a one point margin.

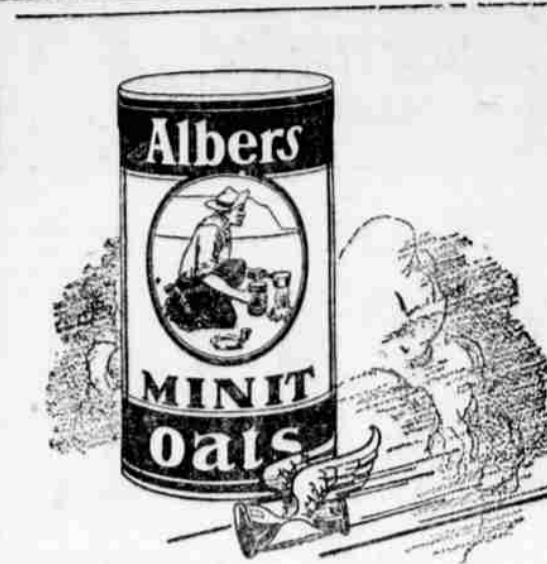
