

EFFORT TO CURB PIERCE'S POWER ENDS IN FAILURE

Attempt of the group in the legislature to shear the governor of appointive power on the fish commission ended in failure yesterday afternoon when the house by a vote of 31 to 27 adopted the minority report of the judiciary committee calling for indefinite postponement of the bill.

Representative Graham, of the judiciary committee, led the fight to have the minority report adopted.

"The governor will veto the bill and there is nothing to be gained by continuing this wrangle," he declared.

Representative Mott supplemented his argument. "The bill was introduced for the only purpose of stripping the executive department of power," he said. "Everybody knows this is the case. Why camouflage it?"

Representative Hammond, Clackamas county, chairman of the house judiciary committee, who signed the majority report favoring passage of senate bill 94, calling for appointment of the fish commission by the legislature, argued for the acceptance of his report.

He explained that he was assured that the appointment of Lloyd Crocker of Roseburg would meet with the governor's approval. Meindl spoke for the bill declaring that it should be voted on for its merit, regardless of threatened action of the governor.

Representative Hesse declared he was opposed to the legislature running the fish business. Representative Winslow, Tillamook county, explained that not more than five out of four or five hundred fishermen in his county would desire the passage of the bill.

He remarked that he thought it peculiar that constituents of Representative Bates, just across the (Clatsop) county line, would be in favor of the measure as Bates explained they were.

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WANT FEDERAL TRADE PROBE OF GAS PRICES

Washington, Feb. 24.—Another investigation into gasoline prices was proposed in congress today. Representative Duffie, democrat, Alabama, introducing a resolution to direct the federal trade commission to make an inquiry.

The resolution declared that during the past month an "enormous" increase "apparently unwarranted" had been made in the price of gasoline, amounting in some states to eight cents a gallon. It proposes that the trade commission ascertain if there is a combination in restraint of trade.

PLANT TO QUIT AS MATCHMAKER UNDER NEW BILL

"I do not care to continue as matchmaker under the conditions in the new bill being drawn up by the council," are the words of Harry Plant, present matchmaker. "The fight game would stop and the fans would not receive the class of bouts that they have been having if the new bill passes."

Harry Plant has been furnishing the fans with good, clean cards so far and there has been no kick as to the running of the events. Plant claims that the bouts are not being run for the money in them but to furnish amusements for the fans of Salem. He has receipts to show that he has not made any money so far this year, but is willing to continue under the present rules if he is able to at least break even.

A statement of three events given in Salem this year show that Plant made \$45.85 on one fight and lost \$20.30 and \$32.99 on the other two. In these cases the houses were over \$500. One house brought in \$563.50, another \$508 and the other \$573. The one Plant made money on was the \$668 house.

The ordinance as now contemplated would not allow leeway enough to get fighters who are good and the fans would be given poor cards. "I would be tickled to death to get 20 per cent as the new bill provides, if it would not hurt the fight game," claims Plant. "As it is now I am getting just about 10 per cent, but the bouts are good."

Fights of the calibre that have been presented in Salem this year could not be given for \$500 as the new law would provide. The new ordinance states "that all money over the sum of \$500 shall be given to the civic emergency fund, to be expended as the mayor or others desire." Plant offers statements and receipts to show that a good card cannot be given for this sum. The armory would cost around \$75. Newspaper advertise-

INCREASED PAY FOR KOZER AND KAY APPROVED

With the alternatives of following an adverse report of the ways and means committee or a favorable report of the committee on county and state officers, the senate chose the latter Monday and passed house bill 259, which increases the salaries of the secretary of state, the state treasurer and the attorney general. The two former are increased from \$4,500 to \$5,400 each and the latter from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

In opening the argument for the bill Senator Miller explained that the salaries of these officials have been the same for 20 years, while the salaries of other officials have gone up along with the cost of living.

"Why it has been only three months," said Toose, who opposed it, "since these men were going up and down the state asking us to elect them to office. They knew then what the salaries were."
