MAYOR INTENDS NO CHANGE IN BOXING BOARD

Mayor J. B. Giesy is vexed over the misconstruction by persons interested in the promotion of boxing in Salem, of his attempt to have an ordinance drawn up to comply with the state law that each city have a boxing board or price fights in its jurisdiction, he obliged to carry on these matters under a boxing commission.

The city attorney advises that the city has never passed an ordinance providing for the appointment of a boxing commission, although a boxing commission has been appointed, and has been acting for several years.

Members of the Elks lodge in 1924, circulated a petition for the incorporation of the fair grounds in the city limits, in order that the city could permit boxing there, as it was the only logical place that could then be found for bouts which the Elks desired to put on for the entertainment of visitors to their convention. It is Mayor Giesy's contention that an ordinance providing for a commission was then passed, but thorough search has failed to bring the ordinance to light.

It is merely to remedy a technical flaw in the administration of boxing that Mayor Giesy had City Attorney Kowitz draw up the ordinance which has stirred up this protest among promoters, avers the mayor. No attempts are to be made to change the order of matchmaking now prevailing. In fact, Mayor Giesy has heartily endorsed the work of Harry Platt.

Mayor Giesy has stated that he will not permit anything to be put in the ordinance that will effect any change in existing conditions, but will merely legalize the appointing of a commission. He has decided to increase the membership of the commission to five, instead of three, as the state law provides.

SCHOOL BOARD ORDERS PROBE OF SECRET FRATS

The secret society problem at Salem high school assumed larger proportions than ever at last night's meeting of the school board. The fact was made clear that societies exist in the school without the faculty knowledge and supervision necessary to keep the organizations from being considered secret societies, which are banned by state law.

The reports, filed with the superintendent of schools and presented by him at the meeting, proved to be incomplete and inadequate in every way, only two being of recent date, the other two having been brought from the archives of the school. The two recent reports, and many of the others, were found to be lacking faculty signatures.

"It seems to me that the reports mean nothing unless they carry the proper signatures," said William Gahldorf, member of the board. The rumor has circulated with increasing persistence that many of the constitutions, even when filed, were not the actual constitutions of the societies filing them, but mere forms worth nothing more than the paper upon which they were written.

Action was taken by the board authorizing the superintendent to investigate the situation completely and report at the board's next meeting. A complete list is to be secured of the membership of each organization together with an authentic, properly signed report of the constitution and by-laws of the society. The report is to be given at the next meeting of the school board.

After the meeting various board members expressed the opinion that the best solution of the problem would be to post the names of all society members in a conspicuous place, with scholastic grades marked opposite each name.

means committee that all armory appropriation measures be withdrawn for this session.

Graham pointed out that the company of the national guard at Forest Grove had to drill in the Pacific university gymnasium. He also emphasized the fact that passage of the measure would encourage the people of Forest Grove to raise a fund of \$50,000 to match the appropriation asked.

Representatives Kirkwood, Longworth, Covell, Hurlbut and Woodward supported him.

Representative Bennett, of the way and means committee, fought the measure. Representative Wheeler, Lane county, also fought the bill.

Next Representative A. R. Hunter of Union got house bill 74, providing for an armory appropriation for La Grande, withdrawn from the table and put up for final passage. Chairman Gordon, of the way and means, argued against the sudden raid for armory appropriations. He warned that they would likely be vetoed.

The house passed the bill appropriating \$40,000, providing that the sum must be matched by private subscription.

Next Representative Mott sought to have house bill 44, providing a \$44,000 appropriation at Astoria. The measure was voted down on the grounds that the military affairs committee had not recommended favorably on the bill.

M'CORMICK FOUND DEAD IN HIS ROOM

though the senator had sought to arise when the bleeding came upon him and had fallen back. The physician said death must have been instantaneous.

McCormick had been living alone at the hotel. Mrs. McCormick, a daughter of Mark Hanna, was in Chicago, where she went to see near Alice Roosevelt Longworth at the time of the birth of the Longworth baby. The two families had been close friends for many years.

Last night Senator McCormick retired early, and as he always slept lightly, hotel attendants refused to awaken him when a caller sought admittance at 11 p. m. This morning at 8:30 he was found dead in his room, but efforts to arouse him at 11 a. m. proved futile. The door then was taken down and physicians called in, who said he had been dead for about an hour.

Although Mr. McCormick apparently had been in fair health, some of his friends said today that he had been greatly depressed by political movements of the past few years. Next summer he was defeated for re-nomination for the senate and was to have gone out of office March 4. Since his defeat for a diplomatic post and his confidants today said he first had hoped to be named ambassador to Great Britain, a post already filled, and thus had aspired to the ambassadorship at Berlin. Word had reached him, it was said, that the latter post, too, would be given to another.

Although one of the younger members of the senate, Mr. McCormick possessed some qualities of unusual brilliance, and had a wide knowledge of foreign affairs. He was one of the most intrepid orators in the senate, particularly on questions of foreign policy.

Dr. Noble E. Haman, who said that the first medical examination after the senator's death had been discontinued, communicated his findings to the coroner, who instructed him to issue a certificate of natural death.

Funeral arrangements will await the arrival of Mrs. McCormick from Chicago.
