

HOUSE PASSES APPROPRIATION BILLS IN BUNCH

The house ground through a mass of appropriation bills Tuesday afternoon. No argument marked passage of the measure, a strictly routine procedure. Included in the measure passed were:

H. B. 466—Appropriating \$241,161 for the University of Oregon medical school.

H. B. 467—Appropriating \$61,050 for the Doernbecher memorial hospital of the University of Oregon.

H. B. 468—Appropriating \$260,000 for providing for neglected and abused children, foundlings and indigent orphans.

H. B. 469—Appropriating for the executive state treasury department and printing board claims.

H. B. 470—Appropriations for the salaries and expenses of the superintendent of public instruction's department.

H. B. 471—Appropriating money for the salaries and expenses of circuit judges and district attorneys.

H. B. 472—Appropriating money for the salaries and expenses of the supreme court.

H. B. 473—Appropriating money for the expenses and salaries of the attorney general's department.

H. B. 474—Appropriating money for the dairy and food commissioner's department.

H. B. 475—Appropriating money for salaries and expenses of the Oregon national guard.

H. B. 476—Appropriating money for the salaries and expenses of the bureau of labor.

H. B. 477—Appropriating money for the salaries and expenses of the state engineer's department.

H. B. 478—Appropriating money for salaries and expenses of the Oregon state board of forestry.

H. B. 479—Appropriating money for the salaries and expenses of the state livestock sanitary board.

H. B. 480—Appropriating money for replacing building destroyed by fire at the Oregon Agricultural college.

H. B. 481—Appropriating money for the Oregon Agricultural college to match funds under the federal Smith-Lever act.

H. B. 482—Appropriating money for carrying on of investigations by the Oregon Agricultural college.

H. B. 483—Appropriating money for support and maintenance of Monmouth normal school.

H. B. 484—Appropriating money for construction and furnishing of training school for teachers at Independence.

H. B. 485—Appropriating money to pay various sundry claims.

H. B. 487—Appropriating money to pay various sundry claims and declaring an emergency.

H. B. 488—Appropriating money for Oregon state library and supreme court library.

H. B. 489—Appropriating money for maintenance and capital outlays of Oregon state fair and declaring an emergency.

H. B. 490—Appropriating money for the eradication of injurious rodents.

H. B. 491—Appropriating money for destruction and control of predatory animals.

H. B. 492—Appropriating money for transferring convicts to the Oregon state penitentiary etc.

HOUSE APPROVES 4 SENATE BILLS

After cleaning up its calendar for Tuesday, the house recessed at 2:25 p. m. to reconvene an hour later, at which time a new set of bills were ready for third reading. Included in the latter was the measure designed to levy a tax on gross earnings of railways and other utility corporations.

S. B. 249, Brown—Providing for a new department in the state training school for boys.

S. B. 148, Banks—To amend section 3054, Oregon Laws, pertaining to opinions of the supreme court, the distribution of the same and provision for supplying circuit judges with advance copies.

S. B. 178, Banks (by request)—To amend section 6020, Oregon Laws, defining the term "public utility."

S. B. 190, Dunn and Carlin (by request)—To amend section 6932, Oregon Laws, tightening the law relating to payment of operating and other expenses of building and loan associations.

BILL FOR BRANCH NORMAL SCHOOLS BEAT IN SENATE

Senator Beale bill which proposed an appropriation of \$125,000 for the establishment of 20 branch normal schools in the state to operate under the state department of education, was defeated in the senate yesterday, the senate dividing evenly on the measure. The bill had a favorable report from the ways and means committee.

Just prior to this senate bill 46, backed by State Superintendent Churchill, and providing for the appointment of two high school inspectors, was killed by indefinite postponement. A hard fight was made for both these measures.

Following their defeat, senate bill 196, also backed by Superintendent Churchill, and providing for teacher training centers in 10 Oregon high schools, was indefinitely postponed, the latter was not considered by Churchill as necessary after the passage Monday of the Ashland normal school bill and was not pushed by its sponsors. The same feeling influenced the vote on the other two bills.

The vote on the Beale bill was: For—Beale, Brown, Butler, Dunn, Eddy, Fisk, Garland, Hare, Joseph, Kinney, Magliadry, Strayer, Toole, Zimmerman.

Against—Banks, Carner, Clark, Corbett, Dennis, Hall, Johnson, Klepper, La Follett, Miller, Ritter, Staples, Taylor, Up-ton, Moser.

POP BOTTLE TRAVELS AROUND 2 CONTINENTS

London, Ont., Feb. 25.—Donald McElhinney, 15 year old high school boy here, has received a letter informing him that a pop bottle, in which he placed his name and address two years ago at Windsor, Ont., was picked up by a sailor off the coast of Santa Barbara, Cal.

Presumably it went out thru the lakos and St. Lawrence routes to the Atlantic ocean, and then followed the coast line southward, probably passing through the Panama canal into the Pacific waters. It then appears to have started northward, to be picked up on February 15, by J. W. Heygart of the U. S. S. Tennessee.

PRE-PRIMARY SCHEME PASSES BY HOUSE VOTE

During a lull in the storm over taxation measures in the house yesterday afternoon, house bill 422, defeated last Saturday, was reconsidered and passed.

The measure, introduced by the Jackson county delegation, provides for the election of two precinct committeemen instead of one in precincts of counties other than Multnomah.

It is virtually a pre-primary county convention scheme, providing for the drawing up and laying down of party platforms in the selection of candidates.

Representative Cowgill explained that the bill did not interfere with the present primary law and

that the people of his county were as one in desiring its passage.

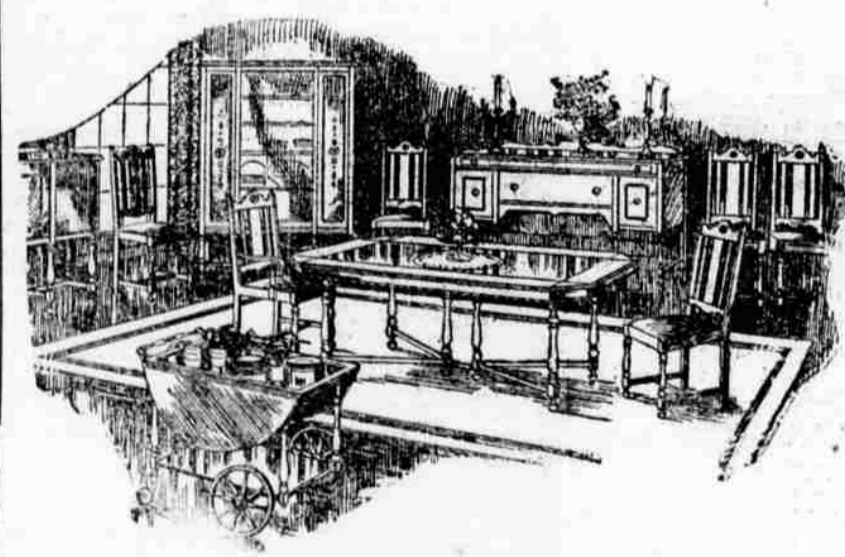

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
