# FRANK WHITLOCK OF SCOTTS MILLS, PIONEER, DEAD

Silverton, Or., Feb. 26.—(Special.)—Frank Whitlock, a Silverton pioneer, died at his home at Scotts Mills on Tuesday morning following an illness of several weeks. Mr. Whitlock was born on the place he died and he spent the greater part of his 71 years there. He was the son of Mitchell Whitlock, who came to Silverton in 1813.

Besides his wife, Mr. Whitlock leaves three children, Leon Whitlock, H. Whitlock and Maxine Whitlock. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Perry Moser of Silverton and Mrs. F. E. Stanton of North Yakima. Besides a great number of other relatives who make their home at Silverton.

Funeral services will be held at the Miller cemetery this afternoon at 2 o'clock with Rev. A. B. Bennett of the Christian church officiating and the Knight of Pythias in charge.

## RUSSIA PROTESTS WHITE LEGION NEAR SHANGHAI
