WARRANT OUT FOR ARREST OF GUTZON BORGLUM

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 25.—Armed deputies today were guarding Stone mountain and the property of the Stone Mountain Confederate Monumental association after Gutzon Borglum was dismissed from his post as sculptor for the memorial.

Deputy sheriffs armed with warrants charging Borglum and J. G. Tucker, superintendent of operations at the mountain, with destruction of the designs and models for the work, early today still were seeking the two.

Officials of the association said a damage suit would be filed against Borglum for \$50,000 alleged damages caused by the destruction of the models.

Under the contract with Borglum, attorney for the association said, the models and designs for the work were the property of the organization. They, however, it was pointed out, can be replaced by the sculptor selected to continue the work by reconstruction from photographs now in the archives of the association.

An injunction now bars the entrance of Borglum, Tucker or their agents to the premises. The models were destroyed yesterday within a few hours after Borglum had been dismissed by the directors of the association. The work of destruction was carried out, it was charged, at the order of Borglum.

REALTORS LISTEN TO TALK UPON TIMBER

There is at present four hundred billion feet of standing timber in the state of Oregon, or one-fifth of the entire amount of standing timber in the United States, according to Representative Fuller of Polk county, who spoke before the Marion-Polk County Realtors' association at their regular weekly luncheon this noon.

Strong opposition was expressed to Governor Pierce's proposal of levying a severance tax on timber in the state. "If a severance tax were to be levied on all timber west of the Rockee it would not be so bad," he stated, "but there is no excuse for a tax on Oregon timber only."

TURKS PROCLAIM MARTIAL LAW IN KURDISTAN

Constantinople, Feb. 25.—The grand national assembly at Ankara has unanimously approved the action of the Turkish government in proclaiming martial law in Kurdistan and declaring it a treasonable offense to make political use of religious affairs.

Kurdish insurgents under Sheik Said were reported from Constantinople yesterday to have occupied the cities of Diarbekir and Kharput. The Sheik has been credited with the intention of restoring the caliphate. A special dispatch through London yesterday said Prince Selim, son of the former Sultan Abdul Hamid, had been proclaimed king of Kurdistan.

AMNESIA VICTIM STILL UNABLE TO IDENTIFY SELF

H. E. Williams, the man without a name, who is living under that identity until he can remember a better one, is progressing very nicely at the state hospital for the insane, report physicians. The name, Williams, was found on letters on the patients paper when he reported in at the police station. He has only been able to recall that he was once in Spokane, Wash., but he does not remember when, at what location, or why he was there.

It is believed that the patient will slowly regain his memory if he is kept in a quiet place and allowed to relax.

WAHABI TRIBESMEN SLAUGHTER 1000 NATIVES

Damascus, Feb. 25.—(Jewish Telegraphic Agency.)—One thousand and inhabitants of Trans-Jordan were killed and many were wounded when taken by surprise by forces of 10,000 Wahabi tribesmen who crossed the border of Trans-Jordan and started a march toward Amman, says an announcement made today by Sultan Iba Saud's political representative here.

(Continued from Page One) came to be a deep hurt was the regrettable incident with Lieutenant Christie, my husband's superior officer. He asked me to go on an automobile ride with him in Hong Kong and the world knows what that means."

Lieutenant Albert Pierce Burleigh, an intelligence officer, who shot himself to death at Mare Island on February 15, was driven to suicide after he had tried to obtain a trial for his fellow officer who was sent to the insane hospital, according to Mrs. Kennedy. "After hounding my husband as near to insanity as they could and failing to unseat the reason of a brave man, some navy officers have determined to sequester him in a mad house because they are part of an organized system which objects to anyone who has not come through Annapolis and because they are scared of what he could tell about Lieutenant Burleigh's suicide," Mrs. Kennedy said.

Lieutenant Burleigh was en route from Far Eastern waters to visit his family on the Atlantic coast when he committed suicide.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Approval was given by the house civil service committee today to the senate government clerks' retirement bill, which would increase the maximum annuity and make changes in age qualification. Efforts will be made to bring the measure to a vote before adjournment.

(Continued from Page One) cession to means which might be employed to return the fugitives indictment under a state law providing \$1000 fine for a legislator who absents himself, was suggested, but admittedly was not a solution to the problem of getting the minority members back to their seats.

Thus far republicans have declined to talk of compromise on the Gerrymannder bill which the democrats insist would give their opponents a strong advantage in electing a congressman from the second Indiana district, now claimed as doubtful.

Only a prolonged absence of the democrats will seriously interfere with the legislative program, according to republican senators. "The biennial appropriation bill is said to be the only measure of prime importance that has not yet passed the senate. Action on this could be completed within a short time.

There are many bills pending of varying degree of importance but failure to take action upon them would not necessitate a special session, republican leaders said.
