

JACKSON COUNTY IS DEFEATED BY VOTE OF SENATE

Called by Butler, Joseph, Garland and other senators, members of the Jackson county team, which was substituted for the original Jackson county pre-primary election bill, went down to defeat in the senate yesterday afternoon by a vote of 13 to 11. The measure provided for a pre-primary assembly of precinct committeemen of the political parties, the assembly to recommend to the voters its choice of the primary candidates.

Senator Dunn of Jackson county explained the measure and it was immediately attacked by Joseph, Klepper, Toose and Zimmerman.

Senator Kddy spoke in favor of the bill, declaring it was a step toward party restoration and party honesty. The measure was explained in detail by Senator Moser and Senator Miller urged its passage on grounds that it would lead the politics of the country away from chaos.

Senator Butler vigorously objected to the measure, declaring it would cause party splits instead of cohesion. Senator Garland also spoke against the bill.

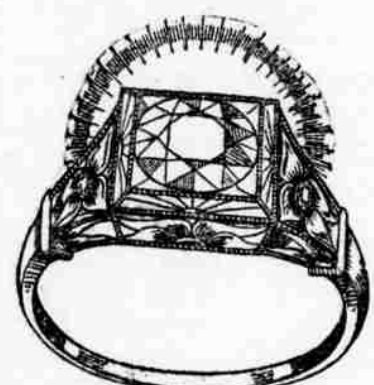

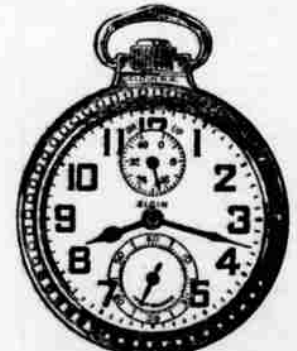

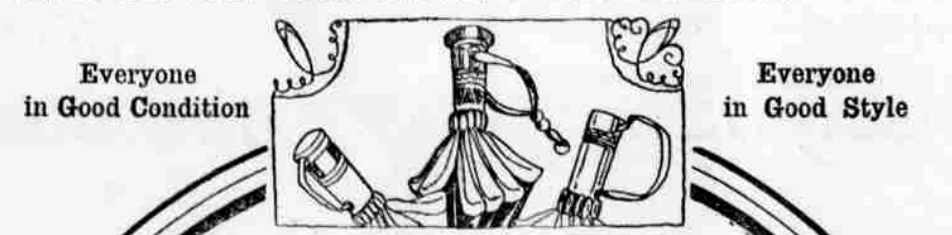
