Fourteen went down with the Hull steam trawler Scapa Flow, six Hull fishermen and twenty-four Icelanders were lost in the fishery steamer Field Marshal Robertson, and news has reached here that the Icelandic steamer Letterhaug is lost with forty hands, all Icelanders.

SQUIRREL WAR IN POLK GETS EARLY START

Dallas, Feb. 27.—Plans for an early start in the war against ground squirrels are well under way in Polk county and through the work of A. N. Moore of the United States biological survey 1500 pounds of poisoned grains has been mixed and left at points in the county available for use of the farmers.

Mr. Moore urges that the work be begun and carried out during March as that is the most logical time for poisoning. Food is scarce the squirrels have had time to do no damage, and the 1925 crop of young is eliminated.
