### JAPANESE LAND LAW NEGATIVE NOT MANDATORY

Tokio, Japan, Feb. 25.—(By Associated Press.)—In the opinion of foreign experts who studied the alien land law introduced in the Diet yesterday, the measure is negative rather than mandatory inasmuch as it is applicable in some cases only by imperial decree. Each essential article contains a provision for imperial decrees. In effect, the law leaves in the hands of the minister of home affairs the decision as to who may hold property, excepting in the case of those nationals whose countries have statutory provisions against ownership of land by Japanese.

### WORLD COURT PROPOSAL SIDETRACKED BY SENATE

Washington, Feb. 25.—Adherence of the United States to the world court came up in the senate last night, but was put aside so quickly that few senators realized the subject had been broached.

When the court proposal of Senator Pepper, republican, Pennsylvania, was reached on the calendar, Senator King, democrat, Utah suggested the objection he had made against its consideration would be withdrawn "if the original Harding plan is substituted."

### TWO HOLD UP MEN KILLED IN ROBBERY

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 25.—Two holdup men, attempting the robbery of a drug store in the residential district here last night, were shot and killed by police detectives who had been tipped off two weeks ago and lay in wait at the store. According to the detectives, the men attempted to shoot when they saw they were trapped but were laid low before they could fire.

One of the men was recognized by detectives as James W. Morely, a former member of the police force, while a letter from Toronto, Canada, found on the other's person indicated his identity as James E. Grayson. Both men were about 25 years of age.

### PIERCE VETOES TUCKER BILL AS STEP BACKWARD

Governor Pierce has vetoed the Tucker bill providing that both men and women applying for marriage license shall file affidavits that they are free from infectious diseases.

"We today have a law," says the veto message, "which compels the male applicant for a marriage license to secure a certificate from a practicing physician that he is free from contagious or infectious venereal disease."

"This bill is a step backward! The applicants for the marriage license, being interested parties, are not the proper persons to make the affidavit. It opens the way to easy perjury. The law should be made more drastic and severe instead of being rendered valueless, as would be the case if this bill became a law."

"I would gladly sign a bill making the present law more effective, but I refuse to be a party to breaking down and making the existing law inoperative, for it has accomplished some good."

### ADD UNIT TO EUGENE CANNERY

Ground is being cleared by the Eugene Fruit Growers association for another unit to their large cannery. A modern five line plant was finished 2 years ago to replace the old wooden structure and this addition indicates progress being made under the direction of J. O. Holt. He has been manager of the co-operative since the association was formed 14 years ago. Practically the same board of directors has served since its inception. This plant is reported to be the most complete of its kind in the country and is said to be a model of a well managed local co-operative organization. Holt manufactures apray, ice cream, boxes, vinegar and ice, packs dried prunes, maraschino cherries and cans every kind of a fruit and vegetable which is packed in Oregon, making the plant a 12 months institution at work every minute.

### NEW YORK CHILDREN STUNTED BY RICKETS

New York—Three out of four infants in a New York tenement district develop rickets before they are a year old, according to a report made public today by the New York Association of Improving the Condition of the Poor. Giving the results of a campaign to combat this disease which the A. I. C. P. has been carrying on for the last five years. The report indicates that rickets, a winter disease, the most marked effect of which is to retard the development of the bony tissues of the young child, particularly the bone bones of arms and legs, is at present a serious obstacle to child health. It is responsible, the A. I. C. P. finds, for the fact that fully 25 per cent of the children in one New York tenement district have serious orthopedic defects, such as bow-legs, knock knees, "funnel chest" and spinal curvatures, and this malady is also held to be largely responsible for the appalling death rate of young children in this district from pneumonia and other respiratory diseases.

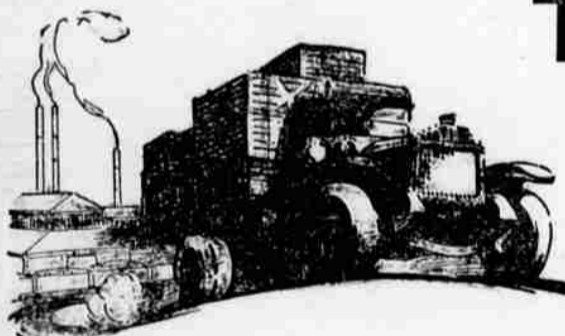
