Portland, Mar. 2.—M. A. C. Fight won the game played in the college gymnasium yesterday when the Portland All Stars, a picked team from the Portland city league, went down to defeat at the hands of the small, scrappy Mt. Angel college five in 39 to 21 score game. The Mt. Angel boys led throughout the game excepting for a time in the second half when the Portland team led by one point. At this time Coach Kaesberger rushed in Arrighi, last year's star, who because of ill health has only been in a suit several times, and his superior shooting ability, coupled with the team work of the other four players, soon allowed him to make several runs. So far the Mt. Angel team has been undefeated. The big games of the season will be played with Columbia university in Portland on Friday March 13 and in the college gymnasium on Sunday, March 15. The team whom the Mt. Angel boys defeated yesterday won from Columbia by one point recently.

Silverton, Or., March 2.—The Silverton high school boys were defeated in a fast game of basketball here Friday night by the Monmouth team. The game was nip and tuck from beginning to the end. Three minutes before the close the score was tied at 14 all. The visitors forged ahead ending the game with a 19 to 15 score. In a preliminary the Silverton girls defeated the Stayton high school girls with a score of 22 to 11. The lineup for the boys teams was: Monmouth—Winegan, Price, Rogers, Widdle and Phillips; Silverton—Woods, Edson, Langley, Blazer and Kercher.

SILVERTON WILL BUILD NEW CITY HALL AND SCHOOL

Silverton, Or., March 2.—Silverton is preparing for her spring building. Chief of the new buildings will be erected is the new school and the new city hall. The building which for a number of years has housed the water commission has been sold and is now being removed to make way for the city hall to be erected on that site. Julius Wolf, who recently sold the land on which his home stands to the Silverton school district, has purchased the vacant lot next to the Frank De Guire home on North Water street, and will move his home to his new property in the near future. The property on which the Wolf home now stands will be used for the location of the new school which was voted at a recent election.

The \$25,000 bond issue of school bonds for the construction of additional school room at Silverton has been sold to the Lammerman Trust company and the Western Bond & Mortgage company of Portland. The issue was divided as follows: \$15,000 at 4 1/2 per cent; \$20,000 at 5 per cent. A premium of \$364 was paid. The bonds are 20-year, optional after 12 years. The board has the privilege of retiring the 5 per cent bonds first.

A program of unusual interest has been planned for the regular monthly meeting of the Silverton Parent-Teacher's association which will be held next Thursday, March 5. Miss Chappell, of the Oregon Agricultural college extending invitation, will be present and will make arrangements for an adult class in millinery and dressmaking. Everyone interested has been asked to attend. Another interesting feature will be the stye show which the high school domestic art class is preparing under the direction of Miss Sara Huntington. Tea will be served by the domestic science girls.

Word has been received at Silverton of the death of Harry Van Ness, now of Portland but formerly of Silverton. Mr. Van Ness has been ill for about a year. Death occurred late Friday night. Mrs. Van Ness was before her marriage, Miss Clara Brown of Silverton.

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LAND BOARD REMITS \$107,924 TO TREASURY

A total of \$107,924.34 was turned over to the state treasury for February by the state land board. The items were: Common school fund principal, \$57,128.52; common school fund principal, income source, \$13,142.56; common school fund interest, \$23,640.85; agricultural college fund interest, \$298; university fund principal, payments on loans, \$2,000; university fund interest, \$193.83; rural credits loan fund principal, \$679.19; rural credits reserve fund interest, \$115,473; A. R. Burbank trust fund interest, \$228.75; Apperson fund principal, \$175; total, \$107,924.34.

SALEM HIGH WINS DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIP

The Salem high school removed the last object between them and the district honors when they swamped the Silverton basketball team on the local floor Saturday night by a score of 51 to 7.

At no time were the locals in danger although they did not get to going until the second quarter. At the end of the first quarter Salem had the lead 8 to 2 and at the end of the half were leading 21 to 4. Silverton made only one field goal during the entire game, the other five points coming from free shots. The line field goal came at the end of the game when Woods threw a long one from the center of the floor.

The game was rough as many fouls called on both sides in the first half. John Drager, center for the locals, had three personals called on him in the first quarter. Heenan was high point man of the game with 22 markers to his credit. He failed to make a point in the Corvallis game the night before so he was about due to hit frequently.

By defeating Silverton the locals are winners of the district championship and will represent it in the state tournament to be played at the Willamette gymnasium, under the auspices of the university on March 12, 13 and 14. Only four teams of any strength will be in the tournament this year. These will be Medford, Eugene high or University high, Salem and perhaps Franklin high. Franklin will probably win the Portland high school championship, but will have to be invited by the rest of the teams to play Medford, state champions of last year, will have a strong aggregation with four of last year's team back. They defeated the fast Ashland five two games by good margins and won the right to represent that district. Eugene and University high have both won a game apiece so it will be between them to decide who comes from that district. Salem won over Eugene 23 to 21 in a game played on the local floor. The locals are to meet them at Eugene on next Friday evening.

The Webfoot basketball team of the local Y. M. C. A. defeated the

Cougars team of the Portland Y. M. C. A. Saturday, when they won the decision by a score of 19 to 5. At the end of the first half the score stood 5 to 4 in favor of the local team. In the second half the Webfooters worked well and brought the score to 19, while Schaffer of the losers converted a foul, the only point of the second half for the losers.

The Daniel Boone Pioneer club basketball team won over the Whitman club Saturday at the Y. M. C. A. by a score of 10 to 4. The game was harder than the score indicates but the teamwork of the Daniel Boone team was superior to that of Whitman. In the afternoon the Shelton Pioneer team of the First Christian church met the Jason Lee team and defeated them by a good score.

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
