

### PIERCE VETOES REGULATION OF FREAK TICKETS

Governor Pierce put his veto Saturday on the Bailey bill which was designed to prevent the circulation of freak campaign tickets prior to elections. In the words of Senator Ritter, who spoke for the bill in the senate, it was to prevent "yellow, green, pink, striped, pinto, koo koo and other tickets of that character." The bill required that persons putting out the tickets should register with county clerks so their identity might be known. H. B. 419, designed to add another inspector of mattress and pillow output of factories was also vetoed.

In the veto message on the freak ticket prohibition bill the governor says in his veto message:

"This bill is intended to prevent the publication, circulation and distribution of election tickets on or prior to election day. I fail to see the necessity of such a law. The friends of good government, lacking the cohesive power of the selfish forces, often have no other method of conveying their information to their friends except through a ticket published and distributed prior to or on election day. I fail to see any wrong or crime that might be committed by the innocent circulation of tickets endorsing certain candidates by certain groups of people."

Washington, March 2.—The house has passed and sent to the senate a resolution authorizing the use of 250 army horses from Camp Lewis in the parade at Seattle next July in connection with the 36th triennial convolve of Knights Templar.

### WARREN CONFIRMATION AWAITS EXTRA SESSION

Washington, March 2.—Because of the legislative jam in the senate administration leaders are inclined not to attempt action on the nomination of Charles B. Warren to be attorney general until the extra session called for March 4. The leaders expect the nomination to be confirmed after a couple days of debate.

### DESCENDANT OF JACKSON LOST

New York, March 2.—The missing persons bureau today began a search for A. M. Jackson, a great grandson of Andrew Jackson, seventh president of the United States.

Andrew Jackson, the fourth of Los Angeles, brother of the missing man, requested the search. He informed the police that his brother, writing from New York on January 8, said he was about to enter a local hospital under an assumed name, for an operation. He used the false name, he said, to spare the family the expense of a funeral in event he died.

### SALEM GIRLS ACTIVE IN DANCING CLASSES

University of Oregon, Eugene, March 2.—(Special)—Edith Pierce and Nellie Rowland of Salem took part in the recent program of interpretative dances given by 25 girls in the Woman's building of the University of Oregon. These girls are members of Orchestras, the advanced dancing organization that sponsored the program.

### NORTHWESTERN ELECTRIC SOLD

Portland, Or., March 2.—Sale of controlling interest in the Northwestern Electric company to a group of California and eastern capitalists became known here Saturday, when information was received that H. P. Wilson, president of the Western Power company, a California corporation, had negotiated the transaction.

According to information revealed here by persons in close touch with the Northwestern Electric company, the purchasing group includes the General Electric. A group of financiers headed by A. C. Bedford of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey was said to have furnished the capital.

This authority stated that the transfer of the Northwestern control would mean that the company's development program for more power on the Lewis river, Washington, would be carried through promptly with an outlay of \$7,000,000, instead of \$4,000,000, as had been contemplated.

### High School Wrestling

Portland, Or., March 2.—The first state high school wrestling meet will be held April 10 and 11 at the Oregon Agricultural college, Corvallis, under the auspices of the Oregon Association of High School Wrestling, which was organized here yesterday. Holland Woodruff, instructor at Franklin high school, Portland, was elected president of the association.

The dances were given for the benefit of the Orchestras scholarship fund. The society, which is one of a number of similar groups in other universities, sends each year one Oregon student to the University of Wisconsin for a summer of study in interpretative dancing. Last year the scholarship was won by Neva Service of Baker. Or.
