## SILVERTON HIGH SCHOOL ROBBED AND RANSACKED

Silverton, Or., March 3.—A surprise awaited Silverton high school faculty members Friday morning when they entered the school building to find that visitors had called during the night. Files had been ransacked, locked desks had been "jimmied," cabinets had been broken into. Papers and reports were scattered about and some money had been taken.

The most peculiar feature of the affair was that a number of grade sheets which had disappeared two years ago were returned. At the time these sheets disappeared two years ago the building had been searched but no trace of them was ever found until they were placed in the principal's office Thursday night.

No clue to the identity of the vandals has been found.

The building was filled and it was necessary for the fathers to place chairs in the aisles. As part of the program the Boy Scouts saluted the flag. Rev. S. The choir gave as a special number, "How Firm a Foundation." Mrs. G. C. Currey was soloist.

Eugene has defeated Corvallis and University high, also of Eugene, but University high defeated Eugene in the first game so those two schools will play an extra game. The announcement that the winner of the Portland high school league, which is more than likely Franklin, high, cannot enter the tournament as they are not members of the state league will leave three known schools who will furnish rough going. Medford, champions of last year, has four of the championship team back. Eugene or University high will present a strong combination and Salem will give some of the heat of them a good run if they are in good condition.

Salem was scheduled to play Oregon City next Wednesday but they have also asked Manager Heenan to cancel the game. Heenan is making efforts to get the Oregon freshmen for that date, but they are not allowed to enter into any activities two weeks before examinations. He is also negotiating for a game with the fast Mt. Angel college quintet. Neither of the teams have answered as yet.

## BEARCATS LOSE TO TROJAN FIVE IN FINAL GAME

Although forging into the lead early in the game, the Bearcats were unable to keep the long end of the score in the game played against the University of Southern California on the local floor last night, and lost the final tilt of the season by a three-point margin. The final count stood 26 to 33.

Drawing first blood when Hartley, Willamette center, rang up a field goal during the first minute of play, the Bearcats drew ahead and were never stopped until late in the second half, when the Trojans, uncorking a brilliant offensive, drew into the lead. With four minutes to play the score stood 25 to 25 in favor of the southerners. A rally by the Willamette aggregation cut down the leader to 25 to 23 at the time the gun sounded.

The only substitution of the entire tilt was the removal of Badgro, who was replaced by Fouch at one of the forward berths. Fouch made a number of brilliant plays including one basket hooked from the center of the floor.

Either team could have sewed up the game by converting a normal percentage of its free throws. The Bearcats converted 7 out of

21 tries; the Trojans 6 out of 13. Otherwise both teams played high calibre basketball.

The politeness which has characterized the U. S. C. playing on its northern trip was not so noticeable last night. Against the Oregon Agricultural college and Washington the Trojans are said to have put themselves out to make a showing of good sportsmanship. It is suspected in some quarters that the purpose has been to create a sympathy for southern California in the northern section of the Pacific coast conference, the idea being that it would help the Los Angeles school in its controversy with Stanford and California. Last night the Trojans played like any ordinary basketball team.

The tilt marks the close of the basketball season for the Bearcats. By graduation they will lose one man, Simmel, who has developed into a scrappy tryer, was guard in the first water. He had never played basketball before entering Willamette. Last night he played one of the best games of his career, his dribbling especially being noticeable.

The other four men of this year's team will be on hand again. Erickson, Robertson and Fasnacht are juniors. Hartley is a sophomore. The freshman squad of the present season is largely an unknown quantity, but it is said that at least one, Reidel, shows promise of producing varsity stuff.

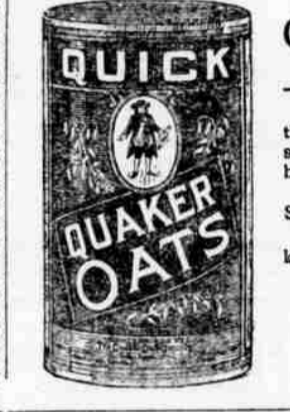
