

### CITY ATTORNEY TO REVAMP CITY PARKING CODE

Acting on evidence brought to the city council last night by the Salem Business Men's league, the aldermen instructed the city attorney to prepare an ordinance amendment, changing the parking limit in the business section of Salem from one hour to two.

A sheaf of papers bearing names of 386 customers at the various stores in the affected district was presented through the city recorder, showing \$20 for the two-hour limit, and of this group, 348 were from outside Salem.

Another exhibit presented by the business men's league was a list of the business houses within the affected area desiring two-hour parking instead of the one hour. This list was signed by 135 firms.

Declaring that an emergency existed, Alderman Hay D. Patton asked the opinion of the council regarding the instructing of the police to simply change their tagging tactics, but such a storm of protest arose that this was not considered.

After C. S. Hamilton, president of the business men's league, and T. M. Hicks, representing the chamber of commerce, had spoken in behalf of a new ordinance allowing two-hour parking, a parliamentary debate was brought on by the making of a motion to instruct a committee on the drawing up of an amended ordinance, Mayor Giesy quickly straightened out the difficulty, however, by explaining that any council member could present such an ordinance.

### THREE ARE LOST IN EARTHQUAKE

Quebec, March 2.—Three persons dead, scores of homes damaged by tremor and fire, one church collapsed and general consternation among residents of the St. Lawrence and Saguenay valleys are the known result of the earthquake of last Saturday night and Sunday morning.

Agent Harvey of the Dominion Express company at Murray Bay, today reported that earth shocks were being felt in the Saguenay river district, the latest tremor occurring at 8 o'clock this morning. Seismic experts considered this a proof that the Saguenay river was the center of the disturbance.

Tremors were felt all Saturday and throughout yesterday and last night continuing today, Harvey reported by telephone to Quebec. Several chimneys were shaken down in the Murray Bay district, Harvey said.

### COUNCIL TO HOLD STREET END OPEN

Refusal to accept the recommendation of the street committee in regard to the closing the end of Leslie street at the Willamette slough was made last night, when Alderman Dancy and Alderman Simeral objected to the closing of this property to C. A. Kibbe at the city council meeting.

That this action would prevent the continuation of an alley behind the houses fronting on Commercial street was pointed out by Mr. Dancy, who attested that with this street end open, the property owners could have an outlet from the rear of the lots facing Commercial, thereby enhancing the value of these lots and that it would not be fair to those property owners to bottle them up.

### 39 ASK LOANS TO RESEED WHEAT

Thirty-nine applications for loans under the \$1,500,000 farmers' relief act of the recent legislature that have so far been approved total \$36,000, according to an announcement by the board last yesterday. Applications received to date number 204. The board of control which has the administration of the act believes the appropriation will easily cover all the needs of the farmers for the reseeded of lands where the wheat crop was frozen out during the winter.

The board appoints in each county where loans are made a committee which must give its approval to an application before a loan on the application is granted. The board yesterday appointed as a committee for Jefferson county J. M. King, Lewis Irving, and Francis Marsh of Madras, H. M. Seethoff and C. S. Marsh of Metolius and George Rodman of Culver. Francis Marsh will be attorney for the committee.

### MARION COUNTY LEADS CLUB WORK

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 2.—Of 495 boys and girls enrolled for work in the Marion county boys' and girls' club work 428 or more than 86 per cent completed the work, thus giving their county a high rating in efficiency reports of club work of the state, according to H. C. Seymour, state club leader. Forty-three clubs had 100 per cent records in efficiency, each member having completed and made a report of the required work and placed product on display.

Canning, cooking and sewing clubs were the most popular clubs for the girls, while boys work in pig, dairy, calf and sheep clubs. Corn, garden and poultry club work was entered by large groups of both boys and girls.

A total of \$15,959.50 was the estimated value of all products—crops, livestock and canned products, belonging to the boys and girls. Expenses amounted in the group to \$19,832.37, giving them a profit amounting to \$537.13.

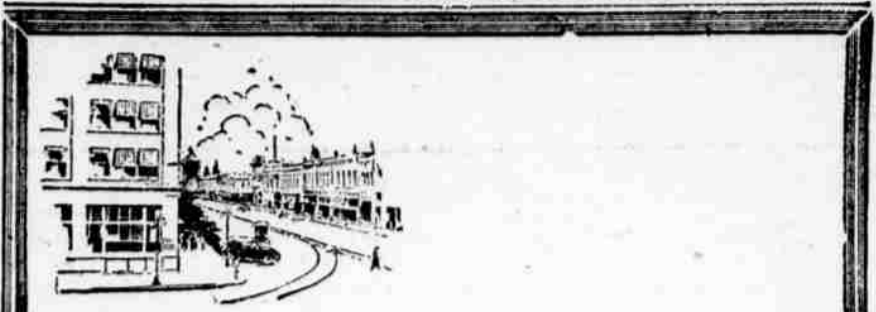
