SALEM CHOSEN FOR TITLE GAME IF THREE PLAYED

The third game in the Oregon-O. A. C. series, which is to be played to determine the championship of the northern section of the Pacific coast conference, is to be played in Salem next Monday night if a third game proves necessary. This decision was reached yesterday afternoon by athletic authorities of the two schools, who came to Salem and looked over the Willamette gymnasium. The floor of the Multnomah club in Portland was decided against because of its farther distance from Eugene and Corvallis, and because it would not accommodate a crowd as large as can be packed into the Willamette gymnasium.

The first of the three-game series will be played Thursday afternoon on the Eugene armory floor. It would have been played in the evening, but a revival meeting scheduled for that time forced the change. The second clash will be played at Corvallis on the Oregon Agricultural college floor Saturday night. In case the same team wins both of these games the third will not be played, but if each team wins a game the third will be played on the Willamette floor.

TWO MILLS NEAR MILL CITY OPEN

Mill City, Or., March 4.—The Gates Mill company, whose sawmill is located at Schroeder, about a mile east of Gates, started up their sawmill Friday for the first time in about two years, and it is planned to operate steadily from now on. The planning mill has been running about a week, and logging operations commenced about ten days ago.


The sawmill operated by Short Bros., located about a mile west of Mill City, has started operations again following a close down of approximately six months and are now loading out their first carload shipment.

About 35 members of Mill City Lodge No. 150, A. F. & A. M., drove to Salem, Saturday night, to visit Salem Lodge No. 4, the Mill City officers putting on the Master Mason degree. Following the lodge work, a sumptuous banquet was served. Masons from all over the northern part of the state were present for the occasion.
