

AMNESIA VICTIM REMEMBERS AUTO WRECK, HE SAYS

The amnesia patient taken to the state hospital for the insane from the police station last week is still a mystery to hospital authorities, reported physicians this morning.

Memory of an automobile wreck is slowly returning to the man, who is called Williams, but he cannot yet localize the accident. No scar or abrasion can be found on Williams' head or body, although he has trouble in using his right arm.

A statement that he was once a clerk in Spokane seems to have been a chance remark by Williams who has not repeated the statement. He sleeps well and has a good appetite, and from a physical standpoint is faring well, but his memory will not return for some time, it is believed by physicians.

MANY FAIL TO PASS BIBLE STUDY EXAMS

J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, has just received results of the examination on Bible study for credit for graduation in the various high schools of the state. The examinations were participated in by 358 high school students. Of the 243 answering the questions on the Old Testament 164 succeeded in obtaining passing marks and 139 failed. Of the 115 taking the New Testament examination, 37 passed and 78 failed.

LEBANON HOPES TO OPEN UP PASS ROAD INTO BEND

Harry Miller of Lebanon, junior member of the Power-Miller Drug company, was in Salem, Tuesday, applying for a loan through a state bond commission to buy property in Lebanon. Mr. Miller is a member of the Lions club in Lebanon.

"Now that the state highway commission has indicated a willingness to connect Lebanon with Albany with a paved highway, the Lebanon people are looking forward to the establishing of a macadam road over the Santiam pass to Bend, via Sweet Home, Foster, Cascade, Clear Lake and thence across the pass," comments Mr. Miller.

That the Santiam pass is a more practicable route to Bend than the McKenzie pass is attested by Mr. Miller. Rich farm lands en route would be developed and served by such a highway, while the southern pass is through mountainous country.

Some doubt as to the advisability of procuring water for the city of Lebanon from Clear Lake was professed by Mr. Miller. Water virtually as good and as abundant in quantity could be obtained from the Calapooya river, he avers.

BIDS ON CITY HALL AT SILVERTON REJECTED

Silverton, Or., March 4.—At the regular monthly meeting of the city council of Silverton, Monday night, a petition was presented was presented asking that wages paid to A. E. Janz, water superintendent for the city of Silverton, be lowered. Mayor G. I. Barr declared the petition out of order because the city charter provides that the wages of the water superintendent shall be fixed by the water commission. Mayor Barr said that the petition should have been presented to the commission.

Bids for the building of the new city hall were opened but all were rejected as they were above the stipulated amount of \$20,000. The highest bid received amounted to \$23,837 while the lowest bid was for \$22,330. The council will re-advertise for bids.

WASHINGTON MAYOR GOES GOLD HUNTING

Seattle, Wash.—Slaking his faith on a map portraying the location of an Arctic bonanza James Townsend Fullerton, former mayor of Port Townsend, Wash., and the founder of a loganberry industry on the Olympic peninsula of Washington, is to make a search with a friend in April for a rich mine in Alaska. The mine was discovered and mapped many years ago by a prospector who died suddenly after bringing out 252 pounds of nuggets, said Mr. Fullerton.

PROBE OF GIRL'S DEATH DELAYED PENDING AUTOPSY

Denver, Colo., March 4.—Official investigation into the death of Hazel Blazer, 32 years old, whose disease had stunted and stilled so that she was like an infant in mind and physical strength, has halted momentarily with a delay in the findings of the autopsy, which were to point out the way in which the "child-woman" met her death.

The inquest was adjourned yesterday until Thursday morning by Coroner J. Macklin of Englewood, a suburb, where the tragedy occurred, when Dr. W. L. Deunis, Denver pathologist, announced that the pathological examination of the body was not completed.

Meanwhile the victim's father, Dr. Harold E. Blazer, 61, physician and inventor, who was charged yesterday with first degree murder, remains in the Littleton hospital in a serious condition as a result of his three attempts to kill himself.

He is alleged to have chloroformed his deformed daughter to death. In the coroner's inquest yesterday, Mrs. Frances E. Bishop, sister of the dead girl; Roy E. Bishop and Dr. W. H. Adrege, the physician who was summoned following the tragedy, testified about events which led up to and following Hazel's death.

Their testimony disclosed that the "child-woman" was left alone with her father for four hours before she met her death; that the crippled girl was physically incapable of inflicting her own death.

FIVE SILVERTON STORES CAUGHT ON BAD CHECKS

Silverton, Or., March 4.—Five forged checks were passed by an unknown man at Silverton, Monday. The checks bore the name of E. D. Mallen and the signature of the Silverton Lumber company was forged. Each of the five checks were made out for the sum of \$37.50 and were passed in Silverton business houses.

It is said that the man who passed the checks was about 45 years of age. He was of medium height, dark and gave the appearance of being very unkempt.
