FIRE IN VENTILATOR NEARLY DISASTEROUS

"Spa, out 4:15 o'clock, in 5 o'clock, nine gallons chemical," is the simple notice posted on the fire department bulletin board, but a situation existed yesterday that might have told a different story had the fire alarm not been turned in promptly, according to Captain William Iwan, who had charge of the fight to control grease flames in the ventilator of the Spa kitchen.

The galvanized ventilator, two feet wide and a foot high, extending from above the stoves to the outside, was incriminated by an inch of grease smoke residue which flamed like powder when it became ignited. Firemen who arrived a few minutes after the fire was discovered found a roaring furnace within the ventilator and part of the building surrounding the flue was flaming. They found it difficult to force entrance into the portion of burning building, but finally ripped through the tin boxing and poured the mixture of sulphuric acid, soda and water on the flames.

Some damage was done, which will necessitate a thorough going over of the flue system and ventilating system, but meal service was not disturbed.

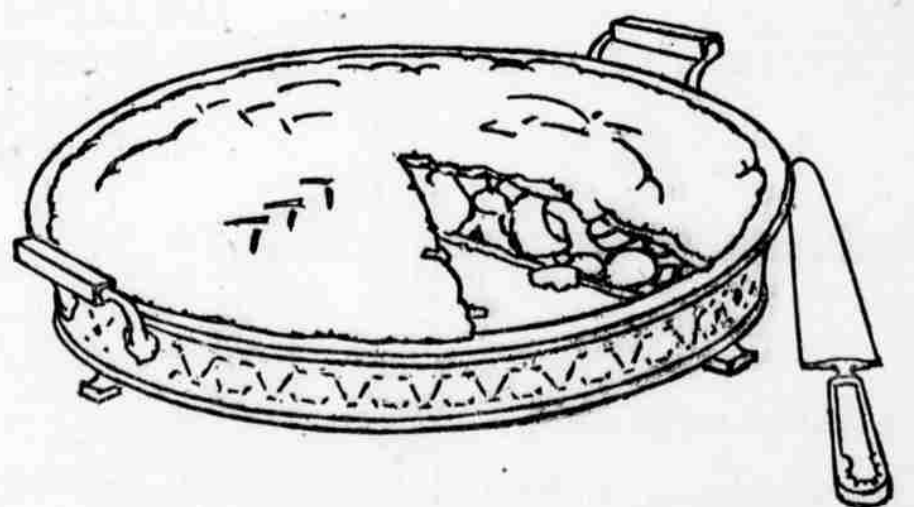

PIE CRUST—Cut the Snowdrift into the flour with silver knives and add ice water to make a dough. Roll the dough out on a board. Dot over with Snowdrift, fold several times, and roll out again.
