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GREAT OVATION GIVEN COOLIDGE UPON EVERY HAND

Washington, Mar. 4.—President Coolidge finished his inaugural address at 1:42 p. m. and his concluding words were left toasting on tumultuous waves of applause as he turned to receive the handshakes of those about him.

He picked up his hat, walked with Mrs. Coolidge to the back of the stand and then moved from the scene of another induction into office, the ninth in his life.

Immediately a signal was flashed to the waiting cavalry escort and it proceeded to the plaza to accompany him on the return trip to the White House. With drawn sabers the cavalrymen waited opposite the inaugural stand for the official party to again take its place in motor cars.

At 1:47 p. m. the party left the capital for the executive mansion.

With the departure of the president, the great crowd on the plaza dissolved, many seeking points of vantage to view the inaugural parade, which already had been drawn up past the south side of the capital.

The ride of the president was accomplished by a continuous ovation. At first he was kept busy touching his hat in response and then he removed it entirely and waved it again in response to the cheering crowds.

His features were beamed with smiles and Mrs. Coolidge, apparently very happy, smiled and bowed and waved her hand as she rode along to four more years as first lady of the land.

The vice-president, too, was given a rolling cheer as he passed. It was 2:06 p. m. when the president's party reached the White House gate.

The military guard stopped at the gate, drew up at attention and saluted its commander in chief with a flourish of the bugles as he alighted and entered the White House.

Mr. and Mrs. Davies and members of the cabinet followed the president and were his guests at a busy luncheon, arranged to fit into the interim while the parade was making its way up the avenue.

Before Major General Hines, chief of staff of the army and grand marshal of the parade, had reached Eleventh street in his march by city stages along the avenue, the president and Mrs. Coolidge and their guests had finished luncheon and were ready to take their places in the reviewing stand. The official party came out of the north door shortly before 2:30 p. m. and started down across the White House lawn. Half way to the stand, however, the president discovered that his father, his son and the Stearns family were missing and he waited back to find them. When they had joined the party, it proceeded.

As a precaution against unfavorable weather, a special glass-enclosed compartment had been built in the stand for Mr. Coolidge and his immediate friends, larger unroofed stands flanked it.

As General Hines, mounted on a big secret horse, came to salute opposite the reviewing stand, Mr. Coolidge rose and bowed his acknowledgments.

Attorney R. W. Masters, former county judge of Douglas county, and until recently a member of the firm of Masters & Pope, attorneys, of Salem, is taking over the law office of Attorney George Neuner, of Roseburg, who is leaving for Portland to assume the duties of United States district attorney. Mr. Masters was admitted to practice law in 1904, and was in Roseburg until 1915, acted as county judge there until August, 1919, when he resigned and moved to Salem. Mr. Masters' family will not move to Roseburg until June, as his younger daughter is a student at the Salem high school and his older daughter, Miss Vivian Masters, is on the faculty of the Salem high school.

San Francisco, March 4.—Photographs taken in Washington today of the inaugural ceremonies were transmitted to this city within a few minutes by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company. The newest electrical marvel produced printed negatives that were as clear and perfect as they came from the camera, although transmitted over 3,000 miles of wire. They appeared in early editions of the San Francisco afternoon papers.

Officials of the company announced that fifty minutes was the average time elapsing between the snapping of each photograph and its completion in San Francisco.

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PRESIDENT APPROVES COLUMBIA BASIN BILL

Washington, March 4.—President Coolidge today signed the bill which would permit a compact between Washington, Idaho, Oregon and Montana regarding the disposition and apportionment of waters from the Columbia river and its tributaries not later than January 1, 1927.

Under the bill the legislatures of all the states affected and congress must approve the compact.

BLACK AND BLUE FLEETS VIE FOR STRATEGIC BASE

Aboard U. S. S. Seattle, Mar. 4.—(By Associated Press)—The Black fleet comprising American battle forces in the Pacific, some fifty-one warships, is in battle cruise formation proceeding on its two thousand mile mission to capture a strategic operating base for attack on the Pacific coast.

Destroyers are the scouts of the Black fleet. These hornets of the sea in extended formation cruise in a semi-circle twenty miles ahead of three divisions of battleships of the Black fleet. They are on the alert for submarines, or cruiser scouts of the Blue fleet.

Ten miles astern of the leading destroyers is the flagship of the destroyer squadrons, the cruiser Omaha. Ten miles farther back is the defensive formation of battleships, train of supply ships and aircraft squadrons, and the screening divisions of destroyers.

The great, gray, black sea fortresses, the dreadnaughts, are in three columns of divisions, U. S. S. California, leading the central column slightly ahead of the flanking columns, while the train of supply ships is in the protected convoy astern of the battleship formation.

Guard against submarine attack is maintained by the divisions of destroyers, in formation all round the battle and supply groups as a submarine screen.

These destroyers move in weaving lines so that no matter from what direction a submarine might approach, a destroyer would be in position heading toward it to ram or torpedo it, or to speed toward it for an attack with depth charges.

Thus the fleet moves across the sea like a great fortified city about twenty-five miles in length and several miles in breadth, with its eyes scouring the adjoining territory for some sixty miles.

BUS ROUTE IS TO REMAIN AS IT IS

Allegation by property holders along the temporary route of the Salem street railway buses, that the buses are causing the pavement to break down, was not considered sufficient cause by the council street committee for the route to be changed, according to George Wenderoth, chairman, after an investigation.

The council was petitioned by the protesting property owners last Monday night, and T. B. Linggley, manager of the bus line, appeared before the council to ask that no great changes be made in the route.

BE CAREFUL

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SECRET SOCIETY HAS CLUBHOUSE NEAR HI SCHOOL

Evidence of the secret society investigation being carried on at Salem high school have come to light this week. Student officials of the Julius Caesar organization, which was organized to give an account of their organization yesterday, were non-committal as to the nature of their club, stating that they did not know whether or not it is a high school organization.

The fact has come to light that the organization has a clubhouse of its own, containing several rooms, and located a short distance from the high school building. The members of the club hold their meetings there without faculty supervision of any kind, according to information coming to light as a result of the investigation.

When asked who supervised the meetings members of the club replied that alumni members were present. There are said to be some 35 residents of Salem who belonged to the organization when they attended high school.

It is believed by many that meeting without supervision is apt to have a harmful effect on the high school students. It is said that one or more members of the faculty has been asked to become an advisor for the club, but they have been reluctant to do so for fear of "getting into politics."

This fact is cited as an example of the intense feeling existing between the organizations of the school.

The K. O. and Friars clubs meet at private homes, and are said to have faculty advisors who attend the meetings.
