

# GOVERNOR LOPS \$504,000 FROM STATE EXPENSE

In the last five minutes allowed him by law to veto bills, Governor Pierce last yesterday announced item vetoes in the appropriation bills for the state hospital for the insane, the state institution for feeble-minded and the state soldiers' home aggregating \$145,655. Also he announced the veto of senate bill 297, providing for traveling experimental work in eastern Oregon under Oregon Agricultural college, carrying a \$40,000 appropriation. These disapprovals brought the total veto of appropriation measures up to \$504,668, pursuant to the governor's statement a few days ago that he must save at least \$500,000 by the veto to save the state from financial embarrassment.

In the state hospital appropriation bill the governor vetoed \$84,553 for an industrial building, \$1049 for machinery for the industrial building and \$4554 for a greenhouse, making a total out of \$72,245 from the state hospital appropriation.

In the appropriation bill for the feeble-minded institution the governor vetoed \$40,000 for a new auditorium and \$25,000 for a new dining room, making a total out of \$65,000 in the appropriation for that institution.

In the bill for the soldiers' home the executive veto fell upon an appropriation of \$7,000 for improvement and maintenance of the cemetery.

The most serious loss through the veto of these measures is undoubtedly the industrial building at the state hospital for the insane. Members of the ways and means committee were unanimous in the opinion that soon after completion of this building the work done by hospital patients would easily offset the cost of the building and reduce the biennial appropriation.

In his veto message on these items the governor declares the sacrifice of the necessary buildings at these institutions is "part of the penalty we are obliged to pay for the repeal of the income tax law, which would have produced \$2,500,000 each year."

"We do need a new industrial building," he says, "and new green houses at the state hospital. We also need at the institution for the feeble-minded a new auditorium and a new dining room. It is right and proper, too, that the cemetery at Roseburg for the soldiers' home be beautiful. However, these institutions can properly function without these improvements."

Relative to his veto of senate bill 297 the governor says: "This bill appropriates \$2000 annually out of the general fund of the state of Oregon to assist in experimental and demonstration work within counties east of the Cascade mountains and for cooperation experimental work within Umatilla county. This adds one more to the many continuing appropriations on the statute books which as a policy of state government, is very objectionable. We now have eight experimental stations in the state of Oregon, three of which are located in the wheat districts where crop rotation should be practiced. It is my judgment that this work should be carried on by one or more of the stations that are already located and amply provided with funds in eastern Oregon."

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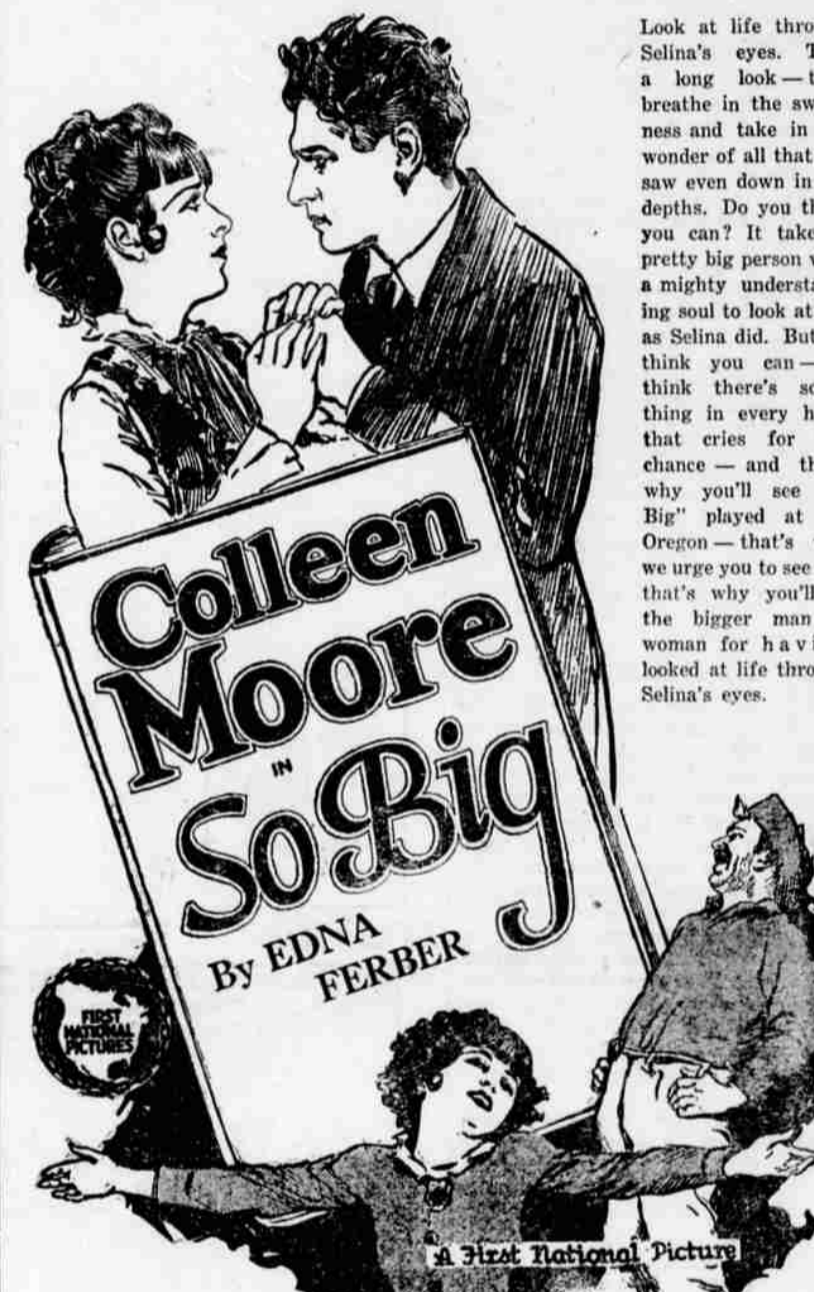
