

TON LITTER PIG CONTEST TO BE FAIR FEATURE

Notice has been received by the Oregon state fair board that \$50 will be added to the prizes given by the board to the winners of the "ton-litter" pig contest at the state fair next fall. The board had already set aside \$100 in prizes, \$50 prizes ranging from \$10 to \$50 to be awarded on the basis of weights of the litter entered, and \$10 to the owner of the heaviest individual pig to be entered under the terms of the contest. The litter ton pig contest is to be the first contest of its kind to be staged in the northwest.

The additional \$50 is to be awarded by the national Chester White association on the stipulation that the prizes go to Chester White pigs. In case the winners in the general contests are not Chester Whites the \$50 prize money will not be given. First prize, consisting of \$25, must be won by a pure bred Chester White grand champion litter. Two prizes, one of \$20 and another of \$15, may go to grades. The money awarded by the board is to go to any litters, irrespective of breeds.

By the terms of the contest each litter of pigs entered must be 150 days old, and weigh at least one ton, in case a litter is over that age, one and two thirds pounds per day for each day over 150 will be deducted for each pig in the litter. The weight after the deduction is made must be over one ton, or the contestant will be ruled out. In case a litter is less than 150 days old at the time of the contest, the same amount will be added for each day lacking from the 150. The litter must actually weigh at least one ton at the time the weighing is done, however, to be entered in the contest.

The prizes are offered for the purpose of stimulating the quick growing of hogs.

Professor Oliver of the animal husbandry department of O. A. C. will handle the preliminary work of the contest. Each litter to be entered must be viewed and ear notched by some representative of the college within 10 days after the time it is born. A second view will be made sometime in July.

Cass Nichols, who lives 7 miles east of Salem, is hoped to be one of the outstanding contenders for the prize money, particularly for that offered by the Chester White association, as he raises Chester Whites.
