

FRESHMAN GLEE SCHEDULED FOR SATURDAY NIGHT

The annual freshman glee will be held by the students of Williamette university tomorrow night. The glee is a song contest between the four classes of the school, words and music for each song being written by members of the class, and the song itself sung by the entire membership of the class. This year's songs are to be of the rally type, suitable to sing at an athletic contest. They are to be judged on adaptability, words and music and rendition, the winning class being permitted to place a silver cup on the freshman glee pennant which has been used for the purpose for a number of years. Judges are as follows:

Mrs. T. S. Roberts, D. Riddle and Leon Jensen; words, Mrs. J. C. Nelson, Mrs. W. W. Long and Mrs. Ada Rose, rendition, Mrs. D. Riddle, Mrs. Ellen Fish and Russell Singer; adaptability, J. C. Nelson, Mrs. Winters and Harold Eakin.

The glee will be held in the Salem armory at 8 p. m. Spectators will be allowed only in the balcony, the entire lower floor being reserved for students and their friends. No charge is to be made for any admission. Each student is allowed one ticket, which he may give to a friend, entitling him to sit at the side of the room on the lower floor. The center section of the auditorium is reserved for the four contesting classes. Words and music for the four songs were written as follows:

Seniors, Fay Sparks and Beryl Masters, music; Fay Sparks, words; Juniors, Helen Johnson, words and music; Sophomores, Herbert Jasper, words and music; Freshmen, Louise Fendley, music; Earl Pemberton, words.

Most of the classes having been practicing their songs twice a day for the last month. Various original formations have been devised for the singers as they appear on the platform. The senior class will wear caps and gowns, tomorrow night being their first appearance in the costumes. The Juniors have perfected a difficult formation which involves the use of a number of athletic sweaters, all members of the class who have earned letters being grouped together in an original manner.

The first half ended with the score 9 to 7 for O. A. C. Both teams were fighting desperately and checking with precision. The score was tied at about the middle of the second half at 11-all, but Steele and Ridings each shot a long hard goal and Oregon was held from then on.

The Aggies had the better of the encounter and showed real championship form. Though the Oregon team fought desperately, and the issue was often in doubt, the visitors had the better team work and the strongest offense.

The game was the most spectacular seen here in many years.
