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Public Asked to Tell on Boozers

New York, Mar. 7.—United States District Attorney Tucker has appealed to the public for aid in his campaign against the sale of liquor along Broadway in much the same way that District Attorney Stanton of New York county enlisted the public's aid in his movement to eradicate saloons in Broadway's theatres. Mr. Tucker's drive is intended to padlock cabarets. Mr. Stanton's appeal to the public resulted in the recruiting of 300 citizens to serve on the play juries which will pass on questionable productions.

Pierce Opens Jail to Free Bootlegger

Mr. Tucker has appealed to the people patronizing Broadway cabarets, asking that every one witnessing a violation of the prohibition laws send an affidavit to that effect to his office.

Mr. Tucker himself set an example in the move to place public citizens' aid in the campaign along Broadway. He spent \$1500 of his own money for champagne at \$25 a quart and other drinks to be used as evidence.

Warren Fight Again Opened

"Because we have the Sherman anti-trust law," Senator Walsh insisted that Mr. Warren's assistance had been procured by the American sugar refining interests to buy stock in his own name for the purpose of controlling the beet sugar companies. He charged that Mr. Warren had actively given powerful aid in the organized of the independent companies under the control of American sugar company interests.

"If Mr. Warren did not know what was being done to secure control of the beet sugar companies of America by the sugar trust," Senator Walsh declared, "he has not enough sagacity to be attorney general."

Kipling Poem Leads Roosevelts into Asia

New York, Mar. 7.—One of Kipling's poems in a book presented to their father, has inspired the expedition which Theodore Roosevelt and his brother, Kermit, are to undertake next summer in search of the elusive Poles in the elusive mountain sheep, which inhabit the roof of the world, the Pamir plateau, in Asia, 16,000 feet above the sea.

It developed that the location proposed today was arranged at a meeting of Governor Pierce and L. M. Gilbert, superintendent of the school, when Koser was not present. Gilbert objected to locating the heating plant at the point where it will now be placed because it would interfere with the school playgrounds.

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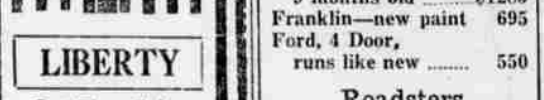
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
